Taking Care of Farm Implements.

Keeping implements in Repair—Work for the Winter Months.

The care of farm machinery may be treated under three heads: First, housing or protecting from the weather; 2nd, repairing; third, painting.

REPAIRING.—Repairs should be systematically made in order to have the machines ready for use at the time wanted. It is a good plan when putting the machines away to make a note of what is needed in the way of repairs.

PAINTING.—This is an age when appearances count for much, and a farmer's standing in the community is often governed by the appearance of his farm equipment. Paint not only adds to the appearance of an implement, but acts as a preservative to many of the parts, especially if they are made of wood.

Use of tools on the farm is of great value as an educational feature, especially when the work is carefully performed. The boys should be encouraged to use tools and held responsible for their care and the character of the work performed.
