Practical Church Union.

Church union is not such a hypothetical thing as a good many imagine it to be. At a conference of the representatives of the Orangeville Presbytery and the Methodist district of Mount Forest, Orangeville and Owen Sound, the following recommendations were unanimously carried. First, that the Presbyterians join the Methodists in Alton. Second, that the Methodists join the Presbyterians in Galedon. Third, that negotiations be entered upon to secure an exchange of the church buildings in Faversham and the Methodist church buildings in Riverview. The Presbyterians to join the Methodists at Faversham and the Methodists to join the Presbyterians at Riverview. Fourth, that the Methodist church at Waldemar be closed and the congregation unite with the Presbyterian church and that the South Lather Presbyterian church be attached to the Dominion Methodist church. Fifth, that the Methodist congregation of Eugenia be united with the Presbyterian church there, and the church building be handed over to the Presbyterian church and that the Presbyterian congregation at Proton Station with their church building, be handed over to the Methodist Church.
