Provincial Treasurer Dies Suddenly

Saturday evening last Hon. Col. Matheson, Provincial Treasurer, dropped dead in his home. He had just that day returned from Toronto and was stricken without immediate warning.

For some time back however he was aware that his heart was weak and might give way any time, and knowing this he made it a point to have his business always well in hand so that there might be no securities to his successors.

His demise will be sincerely mourned by his own party and many outside of it. He was a useful member of the Whitney government, if not perhaps brilliant and his industry was ever commendable.

His successor is likely to be Hon. L. B. Lucas, at present a member of the government without portfolio, and speculation is rife as to who will step into the Lucas shoes. Among five or six "possibles" R. R. Gamey is mentioned.

Mr. T. White is hitting snags in his efforts to secure a bill for the purpose of having the Bank National, a shaky institution. Even Finance ministers have their troubles and the Borden government is having its share of them.

Hon. George E. Foster leaves in a week or two for New Zealand and Australia to arrange for inter-colonial markets we presume and stimulate commerce between the overseas dominions of the British Empire. He is also promoting a bill to facilitate trade with the West Indies. All good and proper; get wider markets at the ends of the earth but for goodness sake don't let them next door. "No truck or trade with the Yankees."

Annual Meeting Priceville Ag. Society

The annual meeting of the Priceville Agricultural Society was held on Saturday afternoon, January 18. There was an increased attendance and quite an interest taken in the affairs of the society. The financial report as read by one of the auditors showed that nearly \$600 had been expended for agricultural purposes and when a few unpaid donations would come into the treasury, the balance on hand for 1913 will be about \$262. The election resulted in the choice of a strong board of officers and directors, so another successful fair may be expected. It was suggested that the nominations for Directors be voted on by ballot, the nine highest then constituting the board. The officers elected for 1913 are as follows: President—T. Scotsmen Fraternalize

About fifteen members of Ben Nevis Camp, S. of S., journeyed to Priceville on Friday evening last to spend a fraternal night with brethren of Scots Greys Camp. It was the 24th of January and the birthday of Robert Burns of immortal memory arrived before the company broke up. Just how many such foregatherings to observe the noted anniversary took place over the world that night can never be known but certain it is that the name and fame of the great poet continues year by year to expand and others besides Scotsmen pay tribute to his genius and the nobility of his heart.

A hearty welcome was given to the visitors by Chief Colin McLean, but being newly elected he moved that Mr. Arch. McQuay, take the chair and under this veteran's guidance a long and varied program of speech, song and story was carried out. He also extended a welcome from Scots Greys' Camp and asked the chief of Ben Nevis, Mr. Thos. C. Morton, to take his place on the platform beside him, Mr. McLean being also honored. The welcome was replied to at intervals in speech or song by the chief, Mayor Black, Messrs. Hather, Hunter, Binnie, Ramsay and others.

We can mention only the chief features of the program. Bro. Rev. Mr. Matheson had a finely prepared synopsis of the features of Burns' life and works with many pertinent reflections thereon. His address gave character to the evening. The presence of Bro. R. H. Miller of H. H. never, also lent interest to the meeting and as usual expectations are never disappointed when "H. H." is present. In a graphic manner he took his audience over all the Scottish ground of his last summer's trip and much of Ireland, England and the continent besides. Mr. Miller has been a competent observer and his address was thoroughly enjoyed.

Mention should be made of the fine contributions of song made by Mr. Thos. H. Binnie, who though not a member is thoroughly a Scot in language and outlook. Also of the stirring music of the pipes in the competent hands of Peter M. Arthur. At an appropriate time there was generous provision for the inner man and the company broke up in the "wee sma' hours" in regulation style by singing "Auld Lang Syne" with linked hands and Scots Greys Camp were noted "Jolly good fellows."

Obituary

By our Priceville Correspondent

In a correspondence received from Mrs. Jas. Black of Oak River, Man., she states the death of Mrs. Black Sr., mother of Mr. Jas. Black at the age of eighty nine years and ten months, born in one of the isles of Scotland in 1823 her maiden name being Isabella Smith, one of the well known Smiths of Dornoch, Ont., in past years. In tracing up the life of Mrs. Black from the time she left the land of her birth in Scotland when a young girl of some twenty years old till the time she ended her days in Manitoba on the 16th Jan., 1913, we find that she came into contact with many obstacles during the intervening time between then and the time of her departure. Crossing the ocean she landed with the family which consisted of brothers and sisters and father and mother. Winding their way along the old Galatrax Road in the new country after landing from the old land about 70 years ago they arrived at Dornoch with the subject of our sketch being the youngest. No roads whatever, partly following a blaze on the trees, but by perseverance and good faith they reached the place where they intended to locate. Being a strong and robust family they soon hewed out a home in the wilderness of Sullivan, Bent, McK and Glenelg, all in the vicinity of Dornoch.

About sixty three years ago the subject of our sketch married the late Alex. Black who also resided in the vicinity of Dornoch on the 2nd of Oct. of 1846 where they lived for some 20 years and was for some years in Bruce. About 36 years ago she with husband and family moved to Manitoba where the prairies of the west was as a desert—uninhabited. Here she had to contend with the many inconveniences that the new settlers had to be content with. Ten years ago her husband the late Wm. Black, died, and now they are laid side by side in a beautiful cemetery in the prairies of the west.

We look at the little girl who is tottering across the floor and we curiously enough ask the question what will it be when this letter is over 90 years of age. We know the past but the future is unknown to us. But one thing certain is that if we live 1000 death is sure to find us out. This venerable lady saw adversity and prosperity or her long voyage of life. She reared a family of sons and daughters and made her home with her dutiful son James where she received the kindest and the best of treatment in his comfortable home from him and his good life partner in her declining years. In religion Mrs. Black was a consistent member of the Presbyterian church and her place there was seldom vacant. She was a great reader and could read and write her own letters until a few months before her death. She lived a good christian life and when the time of her departure came she could enter the world found in Revelation, 14 chap and the middle clause of the 13th verse: "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord" &c. The funeral was largely attended. Mrs. Black was an aunt of Rev. Dr. J. Fraser Smith, late of China, but now of Comber, Ont, and of the Rev. Jas Skene, of one of the parishes of Ontario.
