

TURKS LOST HEAVILY.

Damage to Fleet.

A despatch from Constantinople says: The Turkish losses in the naval battle with the Greek fleet off the Dardanelles on January 18 totalled four officers and 36 men killed. while 164 others were wounded. In the course of the fight a Greek shell exploded inside one of the turrets of the Turkish battleship Torgut Reis, killing and wounding every man in it, and disabling both of the 11-inch guns.
