"COLD LIGHT" DISCOVERED.

It May Revolutionize Electric Lighting.

M. Dussaud, a French scientist, who has discovered a means for the production of what he terms "cold light," gives some details of his discovery, which, it is thought, may revolutionize electric lighting. Starting on the principle that rest is as essential to matter as to animal organism, he has constructed an electric lamp in which the light is concentrated on a single point by filaments working successively through a lens magnifying a thousandfold. Thus he has succeeded in concentrating a 2,000 candle-power light on one point by filaments working successively; through a lens magnifying a thousandfold. Thus he has succeeded in concentrating a 2,000 candle-power light on one point, and in passing 23 volts into an eight-volt lamp, which with the ordinary light would burst.

Experiments with this lamp have established that the new light is absolutely without danger, as no heat is given off, and it requires a hundred times less current than the ordinary lamp. It can be worked by a tiny battery, or sufficient motive power can be obtained from a jet of water from an ordinary faucet, or even a squirrel turning a cage.

FAMOUS PEARLS OF HISTORY.

Largest Is Two Inches Long and Is Worth \$80,000.

The pearl is the only gem needing not the hand of man to bring to perfection, and history affords ample evidence of the intense fascination it has always exercised among the people of every age. It is the oldest object of personal adornment.

Indian mythology often speaks of the pearl, attributing its discovery to the god Vishnu, who is said to have caused it to be drawn from the ocean for his daughter Pandia. The records of the Romans, Babylonians, Persians and Egyptians also make mention of it. There was a pearl of the Emperor Caligula, who, for an ordinary betrothal feast, decked herself with pearls to the value of \$300,000, and Julius Caesar presented Servilia, the property of Brutus, with a specimen valued at \$50,000.

Coming to more recent epochs, we find that Philip II, King of Spain, paid \$40,000 for a single pearl, known as "Peregrina." Found in Panama, it was pear-shaped and weighed 4 carats. Another King of Spain, Philip IV., purchased one weighing 26 carats. It was brought from India. France, also, owns some exquisite examples; but the biggest pearl known is the one which was once the property of the banker Henry Philip Hope, cylindrical in form, it is two inches in circumference at one end and three and a half inches at the other. It weighs 1,800 grains and is valued at \$60,000.

TELEGRAPHS A PHOTOGRAPH.

French Inventor Discovers Way to Send Pictures by Wire.

Edouard Belin, a French inventor, has succeeded in telegraphing a photograph from Bordeaux to Paris in four minutes. Instead of using selenium he prepares a photographic plate the basis of which is bichromated gelatin and the surface of which is uneven. A small metal point passing over the uneven surface of the plate causes a variation of the electric current, which makes possible the transmission over a telegraph or telephone wire of the lights and shades of half-tone plates with remarkable regularity and speed.

The most interesting feature of M. Belin's invention is that it is possible to carry about a small apparatus, weighing about sixteen pounds, and immediately attach it at any telephone station. This makes it possible to phone pictures over long distances.

The results obtained seem to be in advance of anything yet done in this direction from the point of view of the clearness of the pictures transmitted.

LOSS BY STRIKES ENORMOUS.

Great Total for Last Year, But Worse Expected in Britain.

What Great Britain is coming to in an industrial sense can be guessed dimly from a study of some staggering figures concerning the loss of time that resulted from labor disputes in the year just ended, taken in conjunction with the prognostications for the future that are being made by the leaders of organized labor.

Up to the beginning of 1912 the record for loss of time in the course of a single year in Great Britain as a result of strikes was about 10,000,000 days, and this total was generally regarded as an alarming one. Early in the year, however, an assurance that this record would be beaten hollow within the next twelve months came from Tom Mann, and this prophecy by the vice-president of the Workers' Union has been abundantly fulfilled.

During the last year the number of working days lost through strikes was 40,139,400, the loss in wages owing to one dispute alone amounting to \$78,927,500. This was the biggest strike in the industrial history of England—the national strike of coal miners in March last for a minimum wage.

The stoppage was complete in every coal field of the country, 1,096,947 workers underground and on the surface of the pits quit work and the strike, extending over the full month of March, involved the loss of 31,567,000 working days. The loss in wages probably is put too low at \$15,785,500, or \$78,927,500.

As if this were not enough, however, huge industrial disputes dwarfing the great strikes of history, are promised in the near future by Ben Tillet, the English labor leader, who has just completed an organized tour of the country on behalf of the transport workers.

20,000 FELL IN ONE DAY.

Surgeons Tell Story of Awful Carriage in Balkan Struggle.

The first real insight into the awful losses sustained by the Bulgarians, the conditions under which their wounded were cared for and the present state of the cholera epidemic is given by Austrian Red Cross surgeons who have just returned to Vienna from the battlefields and Constantinople.

Professor Clairmont, who accompanied the unit sent to Bulgaria, declares that the Bulgarian losses before the Chatalja lines were very great, no less than 20,000 falling in one day. According to some of the other doctors the transport arrangements for the wounded were appallingly inadequate.

The Austrian unit stationed near Kirk Kilisse, where the most severe cases were treated, had on some days over a hundred operations, a half-hour each. The work was carried on under great difficulties, often with insufficient food. The surgeons and nursing sisters underwent great hardships on the journey to Kirk Kilisse, and on arriving there spent the first five nights in the open air and with only tea and bread on which to subsist.

Speaking of the cholera outbreak the Austrian Red Cross surgeon, Dr. Wimmer, who has just returned from Constantinople, declares that the disease is still rampant there and that it is all over is entirely erroneous. When he left Constantinople fifty to one hundred deaths were reported daily. Hundreds died without receiving the slightest care or medical attention. Deserters were apparently with deliberate intent allowed to die like dogs without any attention being given them.

Dr. Wimmer states that Austrian doctors found that injections of Vienna Paltauschen serum gave wonderfully successful results, saving 45 per cent. of the cholera cases in which it was used, while the serums used by the English, French and German doctors saved only 40 per cent.

It takes three seconds for a cable message to cross the Atlantic. Cable costs about \$1,000 a mile to lay, and the total amount existing at the bottom of the ocean represents a value of \$250,000,000.
