Our neighbors to the South are making a notable change in lengthening the Presidential term to six years. It will finally be carried as now outlined it will be carried Roosevelt, Taft or Wilson, or any future President from trying for a second term.

Londonderry, Ireland, furnished a spectacular election last week by returning a Home Rule member by a majority of 57. This gives the Home Rulers 17 seats in Protestant Ulster, the Unionists having 16. The rest of Ireland is overwhelmingly Nationalist.

After four days' debate the House of Lords threw out the Home Rule bill by a vote of 329 to 69. They will have another chance to do likewise next session, and if the Asquith government is still in power Home Rule will go into force May 1914.

Manitowin went "Dry" last week, the vote taken on the Canada Temperance Act resulting in a majority of over 200 for the measure. This Act is the first of its kind, now so amended as to be practically Local Option.

The latest scheme of Lloyd George to further his life work of "cutting a path through the jungle that humanity may reach the light" is a great last measure to lift the lot of the actual toilers out of the slough that even modern conditions have left them. A feature of the scheme is a minimum wage of one pound a week for farm laborers and a plot of land for each of them.

Tuesday last the second session of the 13th Legislature of Ontario opened with great éclat. The session promises to be of more than usual interest. At no period of his career has Sir James been so closely pressed on public questions as he has at present.

The Warden's Address.

Dr. Mearns Seeks Advanced Legislation re Roads and Bridges.

In his address to the County Council, Warden Mearns advocated many progressive steps, which, if carried forward, should bring the County of Grey to the front in a few years.

Following is the address: To the members of the County Council of the County of Grey: Gentlemen, I beg leave to tender to you my sincere thanks for the honor conferred upon me in electing me to the responsible position of Warden of the County.

To the utmost of my ability, I assure you, I shall strive to uphold the honor and the dignity of this County Council and do all in my power to see that every member and every municipality receives fair play and justice.

I would draw the attention of the Council to the fact that our procedure by-law has become antiquated and that a committee should be appointed to properly revise the same.

It is also my opinion that the Legislature should be memorialized by the Council, praying that a fixed length of approach, else a definite maximum percentage of grade for such approach in all bridges situated within local municipalities and likely to come within the 300 foot span as determined by the municipal Act.

Again I am of the opinion that a comprehensive view, as a whole, of all county bridge building should be taken with the object of determining whether or not this county is getting full value for the large amount of money expended.

It is now quite a number of years since this council looked into the matter of a county road system (now adopted by seven counties in the province), and possibly another investigation along this line would prove advantageous and keep this county abreast of the times.

If within the power of the county council I would earnestly bespeak that strenuous effort be put forth to (if at all possible) secure railway communication between Owen Sound and Meaford and thereby facilitate proper transportation accommodation as between the eastern and western portions of the county.

An Old-Time Curling Deescourse

The late Rev. Dr. Watterstone, parish minister at Birkenhead, Scotland, was a most exemplary man and a keen curler. He was, it appears a character. Then ma' brethren we get ready our besoms and sweep the ice clear o' the snaws of mischief and villainy, and lay the rinks for the great bonspiel of existence.

And for the sake of bringing it hame mair clear tae ye my brethren, there is mysel' skipkin' the rink o' the righteous, wi' John Patterson our faithful' elder, ma third han; William Watson, second; and Feter the beadle leading. And in the rink o' the unrighteous there is Lucifer and his chosen representatives in this parish, their helpers and successors, and aibler-d'vils maybe than themselves-I mean George Thompson the flesher and ma brother Tam, the horse dealer- and Geodie, need I say skipkin'.

Noo, ma brethren, rin doon the doot an' his rinks as much as ye like, but dinna ony o' ye think for a single moment that they canna play. No, no! they're a' clever-I may say owre clever.

Noo, we hae curled awa' a while, Sometimes we were up; and whiles, ma brethren, they played strong, and we worked our righteous besoms and soopit them out a' thegither; and sometimes we played a wee hard and they carried us through a' ice with their infernal besoms o' corruption. And whiles we were weak and no owre the big score I'm sorry to say, and whiles we were off the ice a' thegither. But at times we played cautiously and carefully and with the right strength and the right curl on, sailed through the narrowest of ports, and retiring a' the wives of the wives of the far-worked besoms of temptation stuck hard and fast at the port of success.

But oh! ma brethren, it has come to the last heid, and the last stane, and oh! it's sair to say, but we are par, and the unrighteous lie the shot. And, oh! if ye saw hoo it's gear did, jist an inch o' its cheek bare through the only port. If we played it hard, ma brethren, we would lift our ain nearest stane tae and it would be as bad as ever. Ma brethren, what am I then to do?

Farmer v Consumer.

At the last election, the consumer was frightened that the prices of his supplies would go up if the farmer got more for his produce. That this is not necessarily true can easily be shown. Here is a recent instance:

Live stock market prices as shown in the Mail and Empire one day last week were:

Toronto prime Steers, per cwt \$8 75 Buffalo prime Steers, per cwt 6 90

Buffalo market highest by \$1 85 or a difference of \$22.20 on the average fat steer of 1200 lbs. and the difference has frequently been more marked.

Now if it could be shown that the Buffalo consumer paid more for his meats than his brother in Canada, the case would stand proved, but such is not the case, therefore the Yankee farmer gets \$22.0 more than the Canadian farmer for a like beast and the Canadian consumer pays as much, yes sometimes more, than is paid in Buffalo.

Sketch of Grey's New Warden

The Warden elect for Grey County, Dr. W. A. Mearns was born in Conestoga in the County of Waterloo and moved with the rest of the family to the township of Normanby when about two years of age. He was educated at the Ayrton Public School and afterwards at the Collingwood Collegiate Institute and taught the above public school for three years previous to entering upon the study of medicine at Trinity Medical College, Toronto. In this institution he took a brilliant and varied course of 4 years winning all the scholarships and special prizes during his time, and graduated as gold medalist taking the highest standard of marks ever obtained by any other graduate during the history of the College.

Settling in Hanover in the early eighties he practised his profession for some fifteen years when he crossed over to Scotland and in a few months secured the degree of L. R. C. P. Edinburgh. The following year he also put in a special course of three months at the Post Graduate School, New York. He has been a member of every Council Hanover has ever had—some 14 years of continuous service—with 10 acclamations either as mayor or reeve.
