To Destroy Pests.
There is a simple remedy for destroying insects that are sometimes found on household pets—dogs, cats, birds, etc.—which is not generally known, but which is said to be absolutely sure in its results. It is simply to wash the animal with the water in which potatoes have been boiled. When preparing the vegetables for dinner put plenty of water in the vessel in which they are boiled; then, when the potatoes are thoroughly cooked, pour this water off into a bucket or pan. When it is almost cold apply it to the skin of the animal with a sponge or cloth, taking care that it soaks well into the skin if the animal has long hair or thick fur; then with a soft scrubbing brush a nailbrush will do scrub the skin, separating the hair as you work. Do not rinse this off with clear water. Let it dry thoroughly first; then wash the animal with clear water and a good strong soap. The first application is generally effectual, but if the case is a stubborn one it had better be repeated a few times in order to destroy the eggs. This is also a cure for the parasite in which mange originates and is said to destroy plant lice also.

Right Way to Stew Prunes.
Wash the prunes and soak them overnight in cold water. In the morning cook them slowly in the water in which they were soaked, adding sugar to taste and five or six slices of lemon.

Rye Pasture For Pigs.
For fall litters there is nothing quite equal to a patch of rye. On the rye they and their dams will be more healthy and growy. In an open winter or where the ground is not covered with snow the rye field will furnish almost ideal green feed for fall pigs at weaning time. Where green feed is not provided it too often happens that little or no growth is secured on fall pigs. In that case the profit is lacking, as a small amount of growth will not be sufficient even to pay for the feed that has been eaten. A patch of green, luscious rye will change all that and make the profit where otherwise there would be loss.—Farm Progress.

Winter Protection of Trees.
Mulching in spring and summer is very valuable for transplanted trees, but is dangerous in winter, as the straw furnishes a hiding place for the ground mice, which would ruin the trees by eating the bark. The winter protection of the young trees should be the mound of earth, a foot or so high and eighteen inches in diameter.—National Stockman and Farmer.

The Value of Drainage.
Drainage removes the surplus water, improves the character of the soil, makes the available supply of water more abundant, warms the soil and increases its available food supply, aerates it, prevents erosion and heaving, increases plant growth.

GREEN MANURE.
Few people understand the real value of green manure. According to Dr. Hopkins of the Illinois station, animals digest and thus destroy two-thirds of the dry matter in the feed which they consume, so that one ton of alfalfa or clover plowed under would add as much humus to the soil as will three tons of clover fed to live stock and returned as manure to the land, even if there should be no loss by fermentation. Green manuring has the advantage of returning all the substance of the plant growth to the soil and of destroying the weeds, while manuring in the ordinary way does not return all of the plant growth, nor does it destroy the weeds when it is hauled out fresh.
