Pulling Out Teeth is now a Picnic.

The Toronto Star says: that since the 1st of January, Toronto practitioners have been attending clinics where dental patients have been placed under the power of a newly-discovered German drug that removes the sense of pain while leaving the brain clearly conscious of what is going on. Experiments with the anesthetic have been thrown open to all members of the medical and dental professions.

The difference between the new drug and chloroform is, that the latter renders the patient wholly unconscious, reduces the action of the heart, and is applicable only with a trained physician in standing by. It is administered only for serious dental operations and cannot be taken by everybody; leaves a sickening effect when consciousness is regained.

The newly-introduced drug gets rid of practically all such objections. While it is breathed in just as chloroform or gas, the deadening action is exerted only on the nerve centres, leaving the brain unaffected. A patient having an entire row of teeth extracted sits upright in the dental chair and calmly watches the operator's pliers pry out one after another. He may even laugh if he chooses, or tell a funny story. But the point is, he feels no pain, and yet knows and sees everything painful that is going on.

London dentists claim that a drug known as somnaphone—evidently the one used in Toronto—has been known and used here for the past couple of years.

Old M. H. O. Won't Give Up.

While the town council of Whitley is said to have appointed Dr. C. F. McGillivray, medical health officer at \$25 a year, on a tender system. Dr. F. Warren, who has occupied that office for eight years at a yearly average of \$100 a year will not relinquish the position.

Dr. Warren has been notified by the Provincial Board of Health to continue his duties, and the interpretation of both the old and the new Act is that the medical health officer cannot be dismissed except for misconduct, leaving the municipality, etc., and with the approval of the Provincial Board of Health.
