'Sam being Tetrarch.'

The Globe of recent date has the following pungent editorial under the above heading:

The Nationalists are having a heap of fun out of their alliance with the Orangists of Ontario and the way in which the combination is working out. Mr Blondin, the Deputy Speaker of the Commons, who not so long ago was telling how the French-Canadians had to shoot holes in a British flag to gain their liberty, in a letter to friend—published by L'Evenement of Quebec—tells how the Government has organized a corps of ten expert translators who will see to it that blue books and other Government publications are translated into French and printed in that language as soon as in English. The kernel of the letter is in the last paragraph: "Mr Sproule has given proof of admirable good-will in this affair, and it is amusing to show that all this is occurring under the Speakership of Sproule, Sam being Tetrarch, and Borden Prime Minister.

Mr Deputy Speaker Blondin has a pretty wit. As he says, it is amusing to find Mr Sproule and Col. Sam Hughes whooping it up for the "ImmEDIATE" printing of all the national documents in French. L'Evenement does not neglect to point a moral to adorn Mr Blondin's tale. It says "tous les bons patriotes" will rejoice with it over this reform and adds that this has been done "during a time when Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the fetch of the Liberal party, counsels the French-guardians of Ontario to speak the English language everywhere else than in the family circle."

The Orangist-Nationalist combination seems to be doing nobly. Laurier is held up to execration in the lodges as a Catholic and a Frenchman, who is aiding and abetting the advance of the French language in Ontario and is put before the Nationalist's readers as a foe of his mother tongue who denied the necessary help to translate blue books into French.

The good Orange Tories "Sam being Tetrarch," are giving the justice denied by the wicked anti-French Laurier. Deputy Speaker Blondin scores a hit. He says, "It is moved and seconded that Brother John Ross Robertson send a copy of Mr. Laurier's letter to the members of The Order next time the spirit prompts him to protest against French aggression."
