

# THE FINANCES OF ONTARIO

## Expenditure on Current Account Amounted to \$10,287,991, of Current Revenue of \$10,042,600

A despatch from Toronto says: In the public account for the fiscal year ended October 31, 1912, which was presented to the Legislature on Wednesday, the total revenue for the year for the province is shown to be \$15,527,991.50. Of this amount \$10,042,600 is represented by current receipts, \$1,786,755.66 by receipts on special accounts, that is from the sale of stock, debentures, etc., and \$3,698,635.84 is the balance carried over from 1911. The current expenditure was \$10,287,991.50.

The total revenue for 1911 was \$15,407,124.82, of which \$10,370,813.90 was on current account, \$2,513,701.26 on consolidated fund and \$2,522,609.66 balance carried forward from the previous year. For that year there was a deficit on current account of \$209,109.15. For 1912 the figures are: Total receipts, \$15,527,991.50; current revenue, \$10,042,600; capital account, \$1,786,755.66. For this year the surplus on current account was \$4,485.04.

The chief items of revenue are: Subsidies from the Dominion of Canada, \$2,371,536.30; interest received from the Dominion on trust funds, \$1,939,818.82; lands, forests and mines, \$2,900,284; liquor licenses, \$693,151; law stamps, \$138,702; education, \$63,544; Provincial Secretary (from corporation fees, companies' returns, automobile licenses, marriage licenses, etc.), \$243,933; game and fisheries, \$133,254; supplementary revenue from corporation tax, \$295,631; succession duty, \$773,752; casual revenue, \$168,139; insurance department, \$1,100,000; \$44,121; \$244; Hydro-electric Power Commission (interest), \$181,707.

In the expenditure column the largest amounts are as follows: Civil government, \$522,451; health, \$1,000,000; education, \$1,000,000; justice, \$674,300; education, \$1,000,000; public institutions maintenance, \$1,000,000; colonization and immigration, \$1,000,000.

**THREE ENGLISH GIRLS.**  
Indeed Young Men to Come to Canada to Marry Them.

A despatch from Toronto says: On Monday three former London (England) girls, all very close friends, and who for the past eighteen months have been residents of Toronto, were married at 294 Harvie Avenue to three young men with whom they kept company in the Old Country prior to coming to Toronto, and who were induced to come to Canada by the young ladies. The triple wedding served as an illustration of the manner in which the population of this country is being augmented, lovers following their sweethearts and wives their husbands from the crowded centres of the Old World.

**CHARGED WITH THEFT.**  
Clerk of the Bank of Toronto in Montreal Arrested.

A despatch from Montreal says: B. J. Brown, formerly assistant accountant in the Board of Trade branch of the Bank of Toronto, was arrested here on Wednesday, charged with the theft of \$3,000. He was brought before Judge Led, pleaded not guilty, and was remanded for trial. Brown, who is quite a young man, blames betting on races as the cause of his downfall. He came here a short time ago from Toronto.

**EXPEDITION TO THE ARCTIC.**  
Will Fly Canadian Flag in the Northern Ice Regions.

A despatch from New York says: Vilhjalmur Stefansson, discoverer of the blonde Eskimo, made public on Wednesday his plans for the four-year expedition which he plans to lead to the Arctic next May. During this time he hopes to wipe off the map much of the white space indicating the unexplored regions of the Far North. Stefansson and his companions—eight or ten picked men of science—will sail out of Esquimault, B. C., the latter part of May or early in June on the 147-ton whaler Karluck, barkentine rigged, purchased for the expedition by the Canadian Government. The Karluck now lies in San Francisco harbor. During the next ten days she will be overhauled and sent to Esquimault, where she will be fitted up as a Government vessel. She will fly the Canadian flag, as the entire cost of the expedition is to be borne by the Canadian Government, and will carry a crew of fourteen.

**WHEN THEY GO HOME.**  
Duke and Duchess of Connaught Will Stay at Clarence House.

A despatch from London says: The Duke of Connaught will stay at Clarence House, which for long has been his London residence, when he arrives directly after Easter. When he returns to Canada a few weeks later the Duchess will probably go to Germany and Sweden for a few months.

**"I MUST BE BRAVE."**  
The Explorer's Wife Is Bearing Up Bravely.

A despatch from Wellington, New Zealand, says: Lady Robert F. Scott, widow of the Antarctic explorer, arrived here on Thursday on board the Aorangi, on which she embarked for the purpose of coming to New Zealand to meet her husband on his return from the South Pole. Lady Scott heard of the terrible fate he had suffered while she was in mid-ocean off Fiji. As soon as she had recovered from the first shock she said: "I must be brave, as my husband would have wished me to." Her brother, Lieut. Bruce, and Commander Edward Evans, of the British Navy, who brought back the sad news from the Antarctic, met Lady Scott on the pier. She appears to be bearing up bravely under the awful blow.

# NEW CURE FOR CONSUMPTION

## Premier Borden Says Government Would Be Derelict in Duty If It Did Not Enquire Into It

A despatch from Ottawa says: The Government has under consideration the sending of a representative to New York to investigate Dr. Friedman's cure for tuberculosis, and it is possible that they may invite him to visit Canada. This statement was made by the Premier in reply to Mr. A. K. MacLean, who moved the adjournment of the sitting on Thursday. Mr. MacLean said that even if only partially effective Dr. Friedman's cure would be a great blessing to the human race. The United States Government had sent a surgeon of its Government service to welcome the German physician on his arrival. Mr. MacLean suggested that Canada should send a qualified

physician to confer with Friedman and possibly invite him to visit Canada to give demonstrations at a central point.

Mr. Borden answered that the subject had already been under consideration. He would imagine that the effectiveness of Dr. Friedman's remedy would require a good deal of time to demonstrate it, and a visit to New York might not have very practical results. He did not know whether Dr. Friedman would have time to visit Canada. In any case the Government would give the suggestion its best consideration. There was no difference of opinion as to the desirability of a full test of the remedy; and any Government which did not take every reasonable step to investigate would be derelict in its duty.

**HAPPENINGS FROM ALL OVER THE GLOBE IN A NUTSHELL.**

**Canada, the Empire and the World in General Before Your Eyes.**

**Canada.**  
The Canadian Flax Mills Co. will have a plant at Guelph. Provincial supplementary estimates for \$1,639,922.00. Hon. Martin Burrell says Ontario lagged behind in good roads. Hamilton teachers in convention resolved to ask for a pension system. Dr. Adam Shortt, before the Committee on Pensions, pointed out beneficial aspects of combined work. There are sixteen prisoners in the new women's ward at Kingston Penitentiary. The smaller lakes of Manitoba will be stocked with fish by the Dominion Government. The Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance may finance hotels in local option districts. Pilots testifying before the Royal Commission at Quebec advocated training ship for apprentices. The Legislature will be asked to appoint a commission to investigate the cause of the high cost of living. City Engineer A. O. Graydon of London died unexpectedly, being thought recovering from a few weeks' illness. Sir Ian Hamilton, inspector of overseas forces, will inspect the Canadian militia this summer. Lord Dundonald will be another visitor. The President of the Quebec Dairyman's Association at Cowansville recommended agricultural courses in colleges for ministers of the Gospel. After having lain in a cell for four days without any medical assistance, suspected of insanity but suffering from typhoid fever, Askl Macthriam died in Montreal jail. Great Britain. Sylvia Pankhurst is seriously ill in Holloway Jail as the result of a hunger strike. The British note to the United States Government asks for arbitration on the Panama tolls dispute. A male suffragist and two women were detected trying to burn the Croquet Club house at Rochampton. Mobs attacked suffragette meetings in Britain. The militants made a raid on the telephone and telegraph wires. The Associated Bonds of Trade at London adopted resolutions urging a uniform Dominion insolvency law, parcel post, extension of Government railways, and several other matters. United States. Paper mills in Washington and California have appealed to the Treasury Department to rescind its order of some time ago admitting paper from British Columbia free of duty. There was desperate fighting in the State of Coahuila, Mexico. Turkey renewed its offer to cede Adrianople and to conclude peace. Ex-President Diaz congratulated Huerta and expressed a hope for peace in Mexico. The French cabinet will consider extending the active service of soldiers of all arms from two to three years. Roumania has accepted the offer of mediation made by the powers in the boundary dispute with Bulgaria.

**THE FRUIT INDUSTRY.**  
Shipments Increased 500 Per Cent. in Ten Years.

A despatch from St. Catharines says: The convention of Niagara district fruit-growers closed here on Friday afternoon. The extent of the industry is shown when it was stated that the shipments of fruit from St. Catharines had increased 500 per cent. in ten years. Where ten years ago the Grand Trunk carried only ten cars of fruit, last year they carried over 500 cars. This does not include shipments by express and other railway lines and steamers. W. H. Bunting advised the growers to go more into apple-growing, and said the growers seemed to have gone "peach crazy."

**MONTREAL CUSTOMS.**  
Increase Over February of Last Year \$234,445.60.

A despatch from Montreal says: The receipts of the Montreal Customs House for February, 1913, show an increase over the corresponding period of last year of \$234,445.60. The detailed figures are: \$2,038,498 for February, 1913, and \$1,804,052.40 for February, 1912. The returns of the Montreal branch of the Inland Revenue Department for the past month show an increase of \$62,176.57 over the corresponding period last year, the figures being \$857,057.67 for February, 1913, as compared with \$794,881.03 for February, 1912.

**NOTED MAN GONE.**  
Sir Wm. White, Naval Constructor, Has Passed Away.

A despatch from London says: Sir William H. White, formerly chief constructor of the British Navy, died on Thursday afternoon in a hotel here as the result of a stroke of apoplexy.
