A Prospective Industry.

Last Friday a gentleman from Guelph, at present running there on a small scale a factory for the manufacture of metaline window striping, was in town. The Mayor and Councillor Lehman got busy and hurriedly called a meeting of as many business men as they could reach to listen to the proposal of Messrs Jacob and Furber.

These two are in partnership and are anxious to expand their operations by making a number of new and standard articles such as wash stands, kitchen sinks, cabinets, &c. They have no capital to put into the business, only some machinery and stock. They desire the formation of a joint stock company to place \$1000 or \$5000 banking strength behind them, and they will give their skill and best endeavors to work up a profitable business, one as technical manager, the other as traveller and their services to be required by the company at \$1500 a year each.

They propose to employ 10 or 12 men at first. The proposition is not gilt-edged, but the impromptu meeting turned the matter over to the Industrial Committee of the town and we may or may not hear more of it.

Obituary

MRS ISAAC KUNSENHAUSER.

Startingly sudden did the call come to the above lady on Wednesday, 8th March, 1913. She was moving about the room in presence of her daughter, Mrs Bailey, Mulock, with whom she has resided for the past three years, when the latter heard a peculiar sound and turned in time to see her mother from falling. Simple restoratives were applied but death was instantaneous, and there was no long agony for the loved ones to witness, the heart had failed and her journey was over.

Deceased was born in Baden, Waterloo Co. 77 years ago on 20th Feb. and last subsequently resided, with her husband, (who died in July, 1910) in Carrick, Brant and Bentinck. To them were born 3 sons and 3 daughters, all of whom survive: Levi in Hespeler; Lizzie, Mrs John McKeilie, Brant Twp.; John and Isaae in Hanover; Lucinda, Mrs Wm. Reid, Lethbridge, Alta.; Hannah, Mrs Wm. Bailey, Mulock.

About 13 years ago advancing years caused the aged couple to move to Hanover where they spent 10 years, and for three years past, the deceased has been kindly ministered to by her daughter, Mrs Bailey.

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At an appropriate time Mrs T. Mc Girr was called upon to read an address to one of their members, Mrs D. McCrie, before her departure for the West. The address below explains itself and their remembrance, a gold brooch with ruby inset, was presented by Mrs Thos. McComb.
