The Debate on Naval Aid

The House at Ottawa sat for 129 continuous hours last week, the opposition feeling that the issue of Canadian autonomy is at stake in the proposed gift of 85 million dollars to Britain on the plea of "emergency."

It has been clearly shown from the speeches of British and German statesmen that there is no emergency. It has been clearly shown that Britain is in need of a money gift, for she is reducing her debt in remarkable fashion and at the same time is spending millions in aid of other nations.

A Poor Statement.

Parliament Buildings, Toronto, March 10th, 1913.

In spite of careful attempts to make light of the matter, the fact is gradually becoming known throughout the Province that in Ontario finances, as revealed in the Budget statement by Hon. I. B. Lucas, there was a deficit last year of \$245,000 on revenue account and that this year the deficit is up to the present, not including the extra supplementary estimates, is \$215,000.

This is not pleasing news and reflects discredit on the Government which has reported it. What is worse, coping with the difficulty. The Government have to be met, but the Hon. Treasurer has refused to discuss the House to discuss the matter.

Some ask for the raising of the weight limit to hundred pounds, and many more for its placing on an entire position of equality, so far as the public convenience is concerned, with the regular letter postal service.
