Results From Horses. From many fragments of the architecture of the early ages, and first allusions to the horse as a domesticated animal, it is obvious that nothing superfluous in the way of saddlery and harness was employed, and on Grecian reliefs and riezes horses are represented as being ridden without bit, bridle, saddle or stirrups, the animals beng trained to obey the indications the hand and leg, while the attachments for draft to the chariots sed in war and sport were of the implest character. As time went on, however, superfluous and injurious portions of harness were introduced, the weight of leather and metal furniture increased, and more attention was paid to appearances than utility.
