Excitement at Ottawa.

The continuous sitting of the House of Commons, night and day for two weeks (except Sunday) culminated on Saturday last with some stirring incidents.

Leave seems to have been given by the Hon. Robt. Rogers to try his hand at getting the measure through, he, it is alleged, having boasted "he would jam it through in an hour". There was certainly an attempt made to "jam" it through by a form of closure, the chairman at the time ignoring Liberal speakers by turning his back upon them.

This roused the fighting spirit to a high pitch, and the Liberals held their ground. Speaker Sproule was sent for and above the noise and hubbub the strong voice of Clark of Red Deer was heard and the speaker threatened to "name" him which punishment is supposed to be followed by expulsion.

Clark was conscious of no wrong, and he was actually "named" by the Speaker. Hon. M. Borden, who must by this time have been sorry he allowed Roger's methods to be tried, came to the rescue assuring the Speaker that Mr Clark had not intended to be offensive, and the "naming" was withdrawn.

Then young Martin of Regina (a relative of Dr. Jameson's) incurred the ire of the Speaker by asserting that a form of closure was being applied. He was ordered to take it back, but this he stoutly refused to do, insisting his statement was fact. He was in danger of being named also, and many other Liberals asked "Name me too" and again Mr Borden had to pour oil on the waters but Martin did not take it back.

It was 11:30 Saturday evening and it had not been "Jammed" through. Mr Borden moved that the House adjourn, which was agreed to amid the resounding cheers of the Liberals and corresponding discomfiture of their opponents. It is not likely the navy bill will come up till after the postponement.
