> Co-Operative Experiments in ticulars apply to Weed Eradication, 1913.

> > Clean Farming.

During the season of 1912, the Ontario Agricultural Experimental Union earried on co-operative experiments in the eradication of Perennial teresting and valuable results were obtained. A properly cultivated crop of rape was tound to be an excellent means of destroying Perennial Sow Thistle and Twitch Grass. Rape Twitch Grass than did buckwheat. Lot 3 on the same Concession. Thorough and deep cultivation followed by potatoes or corn gave good results in the control of Bladder Campion. Spraying with Iron or Copper Sulphate proved to be a cheap and effective means of destroying Mustard in growing grain without injury to the crop. Those who took part in these experiments profited by the experience. They cleaned the field experimented upon, demonstrated to their own satisfaction the effective ness of the method fried and at the same time their results furnished

These co-operative experiments in weed eradication will be continued this year (1913) and it is hoped that a large number of men will take part in them in order that sufficient data may be gathered to warrant definite statements being made regarding the best methods of controlling these pernicions weeds. The experiments are as follows: (1) The use of rape in the destruction of Perennial Sow Thistle. (2) A system of intensive cropping and cultivation, using Winter Rye followed by turnips, rape or buckwheat, for eradicating Perenn.al Sow Thistle. (3) The use of Rape in the destruction of Twitch Grass. (4) A method of cultivation and cropping for the destruction of Twiteh Grass. (5) A method for the eradication of Bladder Campion or Cow Bell. (6) Spraying with Iron Sulphate to destroy mustard in cereal crops.

Those who are troubled with any of those bad weeds are invited to write to the Director of Co-operative Experiments in Weed Eradication, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph Ontario, who will be glad to furnish full information concerning these experiments and to supply application blanks for the same. All experi-menters will be suppled with full and detailed instructions for carrying on the experiment selected and with blank forms on which to report the results of the same. All interested in elcan farming are asked to co-operate in this work. Address all communications to J. E. Howitt, Botanical Department, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, Oatario.
