The Post Office Site again the Burning Question

Continued from page 1.

Mr. Whelan defended himself vigorously. All knew how hard it was to prove a man drunk. He was doing his duty to the best of his ability. He excused himself for not taking action because Mr. Kinne depended upon witnesses and the man was out of town. "You give him lots of chances to get away," retorted Kinne. The constable said he was out of town on instructions from the magistrate. Councillors McKeechie, Leaban and Lloyd passed severe strictures on the constable. Councillor Cochrane had been around but did not hear the bad language. Reeve Calder said there was no reason for the state of the town as had for a month or two back. Councillor Saunders had also been hearing complaints about inefficient work and thought quite a lot of things were going on in town that should not be. The Mayor said "Mr. Prudham I think both constable and magistrate neglected their duties that day; they won't do it again."

The seriousness of the situation was strongly felt by the council and no doubt the ventilation of the subject got will produce better results. The following motion was unanimously carried: Calder—Furneaux—That after hearing deputation referring to blasphemous language on the street and infringement of the Local Option by-law, the town constable be instructed to institute prosecutions against any such offences and that he be called for sufficient evidence has been placed with him, the Council shall then take action on the subject. Carried.

CLARK ASSESSMENT
A long discussion took place on the status of Mr. Zeuss Clark as to his assessment. Four or five years ago Mr. Clark was asked to come to town and was promised a "fixed assessment" of \$500 for a term of years. Messrs. Saunders and Cochrane have the idea this was to be the total, certainly Mr.

Clark understood it so but it is taken by the assessor to mean only realty, and to this to be added, business tax and sidewalk tax. Mr. Clark objects to the business tax as a violation of the agreement, which seems to have been loosely made and not recorded. It seems only fair Mr. Clark should have consideration. He was asked to come and since coming has built two good houses. Assessor and council will no doubt see justice done.

Saunders—Cochrane—That Wm. Collinson have use of east end of Sadler St for one dollar a year. Car. By-law 634, which appears in this issue, received its two readings and passed through committee. A change had been made from the original draft and Coun. Saunders objected to this having been done at special meetings of council called during business hours.

It was now 12 o'clock and there was yet to tackle the post office site. The reeve suggested leaving the matter over but the majority were for closing the matter up. The reeve went into a rehearsal of the steps taken up to the present time and one member of the council facetiously thought closing the matter would have to be applied.

While not opposing the Town Hall site he urged delay till a clearing up of the title took place and not follow what he designated the cowardly course of leaving trouble to future councils.

His arguments, strong as we believe they were, did not weigh with the Council. A motion drawn up by Councillor Saunders, seconded by Coun. McKeechie, brought an amendment by Calder—Furneaux urging delay till steps had been taken to clear the title. The amendment was voted down and the years and days being called for it sufficient evidence has been placed with him, the Council shall then take action on the subject. Carried.
