The Durham Review

—Among the prohibitions in the new Marriage Act is one forbidding the issuing of licenses to any party who is an idiot, insane, or under the influence of liquor. These who are in the habit of getting under the influence will not appreciate being classed along with idiots and insane as being unfit to marry and propagate their kind.

—Cut it off at both ends Mr. Hanna. We refer to the new restriction on the liquor traffic forbidding the opening of bars before 8 a. m. instead of 6 a. m. formerly. An hour off the other end of the day would accomplish more, but clipping off at both ends until there is nothing more to clip would be the true policy. Restriction at 7.30 a. m. will not prevent treating at 7.30 p. m. and prevention of treating was at one time Mr. Whitney's policy.

—Hon. Mr. Hanna introduced the government's temperance measure into the Legislature last week, and though far short of what temperance people expect, it contains some good points. Briefly they are: 1—The bottle trade is to be eliminated from hotels. 2—Bars are not to open till 8 a. m. instead of 6. 3—Shop licenses to be raised to same level as tavern licenses. 4—Restrictions to prevent storing of liquor in stables. 5—That two hours had not been cut off the other end of the day, but it is coming.

—An extraordinary course was pursued in Parliament last week by Mr. Borden and his friends in handing out an insult to Sir Wilfrid Laurier who rose along with Mr. Hazen to speak on the Closure Bill. Sir Wilfrid was given precedence by Speaker Sproule, yet by a preconcerted arrangement a vote was taken giving Mr. Hazen the floor over the speaker's ruling. Gries of "shame" greeted the action and much adverse comment has been made in Canadian and British papers over the insult to the ex-premier, who under all circumstances has been the soul of courtesy to his opponents. Mr. Borden it appears is completely under the control of Rogers of Manitoba fame, who tried and failed two weeks ago to "jam" the Naval bill through.

Doings in the Legislature.

Amongst the notable things in the Legislature last week were: the efforts of Mr. Rowell and the opposition to secure speedy action in giving farmers the benefits of the Hydro; Mr. Hanna's amendments to the License Act, referred to elsewhere; the voting down by the government of the Opposition bill to exclude club licenses from local option territory; Eight Hour Day bill for miners carried unanimously; supplementary estimates brought down totalling \$14,000,000.

A severe attack on the Education Department was made by Thos. Marshall, Allan Studholme and N. W. Rowell; Mr. Hanna's Assessment Act changes fails to give reform as far as land and buildings is concerned; greatest of all, in the last days of the session, is the bill introduced by Mr. Hearst to give the Northern Ontario Railway company 138,000 acres of land at 25c and 50c an acre, they to build a railway 325 miles in length, settle 3750 settlers in 10 years, erect schools and build highways and provide plants to manufacture timber cut by settlers.

It is earnestly to be hoped that the above measure will not be railroaded through in the hurried closing days of the session without full discussion.

Mrs Sproule true to Principle.

No Wine at Speaker's Functions.

Mrs Thomas Sproule, wife of the Speaker of the House of Commons at Ottawa, has made history since she became mistress of the Speaker's chambers in the Parliament Buildings at the Capital. All her life an ardent temperance worker and prominent in the activities of the W.C.T.U. when her husband became the first member of the Commons, she decided that she would not go back in any way on her lifelong principles and announced that no wine of any kind would be served at any of the many functions that are held in the Speaker's apartments. As wife of the Speaker, Mrs Sproule has energetic social duties which she has carried out both with tact and grace. Mrs Sproule is a prominent charity worker and while, naturally, since coming to Ottawa, she has not taken the same active part in the work of charitable societies, yet she and the Speaker are most regular attendants at the Dominion Methodist Church. Mrs Sproule is a kindly motherly woman, whose head has not been turned by the honors which have come upon her.—News

"Let Justice Alone."

The Flesherton Advance last week in an able and timely article, condemns the attempts of a portion of the O. Sound press to work up sympathy for the murderer Love and to hint that something about the trial was not quite fair. It denies that a "wave of sympathy" is spreading round Ceylon and says: "We have yet to find a man in this section who does not believe that the verdict was a just one or that the accused received as fair a trial as could possibly be given under British law."

The Advance claims and we think rightly, that as long as capital punishment is a tenet of British justice, such a crime as this should see the full penalty exacted. The closing paragraph reads:

"The enormity and brutality of the crime under consideration call for justice, and no maudlin sentiment should be allowed to interfere with its course. To those who saw with their own started eyes the horrible result of the crime no such advice need be applied; to others, including the press of the county, we appeal in the hope that they will leave the matter wholly in the hands of the authorities and the Department of Justice, who are quite competent to deal with the matter without advice from those who appear to be desirous of interfering. The man who killed this little woman is certainly deserving of hanging if ever man was deserving. The jury said that Love is the man. When the evidence is weighed by the Department of Justice that tribunal, which is final, will decide whether the jury was justified in bringing in such a verdict. Any attempt by the newspapers to create a fictitious sympathy and cast abroad false impressions, as we believe has been done, is most unseemly and ill-advised."

Artemesia Council.

Artemesia Council met at Eugenia on Saturday, April 5, 1913. The members were all present, the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of last session were read and confirmed. The following communications, etc. were presented and read: W. J. Meads, protesting against placing his lands in another road division; Robert Gorley, complaining that Robt. Williams had not yet removed his fences from certain streets in Engenia; J. H. Parsons, claim for change of \$1 for a dog assessed in 1912; W. H. Wright, account for legal advice, Re Melia claim and Nesbitt's taxes, \$4.00; Robert Campbell personally waited on the council, asking compensation for right of way through his lot 24, con 12; Robt. Graham waited on the council, asking compensation for right of way through his lot 23, con 12.

Caswell—Brown—That by-law 763 appointing municipal officers for 1913 be now read a third time, signed, sealed and entered in by-law book.—Carried.

Brown—McLeod—That John Parlow be refunded \$1.00, being dog tax charged in 1912; the assessor certifying that the charge was in error.—Carried.

Graham—Caswell—That a by-law be introduced and passed to reduce the Treasurer's salary in proportion to the lessening of his work, caused by the incorporation of the village of Flesherton.—Carried.

Brown—McLeod—That the account of W. H. Wright, \$4.00 for legal advice in the Melia and Nesbitt cases, be paid.—Carried.

McLeod—Brown—That lots 29 and 30, con 1, N. D. R. be placed in road division No. 39.—Carried.

Caswell—Graham—That all parties are hereby warned that this council will hold them liable for any damages which may result through the placing of rural mail delivery post-boxes on the highways of this municipality.—Carried.

Caswell—Graham—That the thanks of this council are hereby tendered to the Orange brethren for use of hall for this session of council.—Carried.

Brown—McLeod—That the next meeting of this council be held at the Town Hall, Flesherton.—Carried.
