NEWS FROM SUNSET COAST

WHAT THE WESTERN PEOPLE ARE DOING.

Progress of the Great West Told in a Few Pointed Paragraphs.

It is proposed to organize a joint hospital commission for Greater Vancouver.

Plans are being prepared for the G.T.P. hotel at Prince Rupert, which is expected to cost \$2,000,000.

Teslin will prove another Klondike, declares a prospector on reaching Skagway from Silver Creek country.

The South Vancouver ratepayers have rejected the proposal to erect new schools in the municipality.

Work on the Lulu Island C.N.R. Lulu Island line is progressing rapidly now that favorable weather has arrived.

The Yukon Council has voted to abolish grants to Catholic separate schools at the end of the term, July 1.

North Vancouver Council will request the Board of Trade to prepare detailed proposals for the extension of the city boundaries.

Owing to an epidemic of scarlet fever which has broken out, the school authorities have closed the West Point Grey High School.

The British Columbia Gazette contains the official proclamation of the incorporation of the new cities of Port Couillard and Port Moody.

"We want a provincial university without provincialism," says Dr. F. T. Westbrook, the new president of the University of British Columbia.

A feature of the new liquor license by-law in New Westminster is that no man can hold a license in the city, nor can liquor be sold to a woman.

Merritt Council is in favor of purchasing for a public park, nine acres from the executors of the Voght estate for \$3,000, to be called Voght Park.

A contract will shortly be awarded for additions to the Land Registry office at New Westminster involving an estimated expenditure of \$25,000.

A new national park of 5,000 square miles, comprising some of the wildest and most picturesque scenery on the continent, is planned for British Columbia.

The Dominion Government are anxious to take over the city hall property in North Vancouver, which they purchased some time ago as the site for a post office.

Ratepayers in South Vancouver are objecting to the erection of a new school building, because it is feared that the value of property might go down as a result.

At the Canadian Canning Company's cannery near Steveston on the Fraser River, 24 experienced Scottish girls will be employed, as an experiment in replacing Chinese with white labor.

Henderson's Directory shows that Greater Victoria has nearly 70,000 inhabitants, the actual population being estimated at 68,785. This represents an increase in eleven months of 11,916.

An old couple, Mr. and Mrs. Schmidt, perished somewhere on the Russell Glacier at the head of White River, the only trace of them being a couple of blankets and a rifle found on the ice.

One of the leading real estate dealers in Vancouver's Grandview district, estimates that property values there have increased ten per cent, as a result of the passage of the C.N.R. by-law by the ratepayers a short time ago.

An explosion of several boxes of cartridges in the store of George Leaf at East Burnaby, set the premises in a blaze, and before the fire brigade could reach the scene seven thousand dollars' worth of stock and structure had been destroyed, only a portion of which is insured.

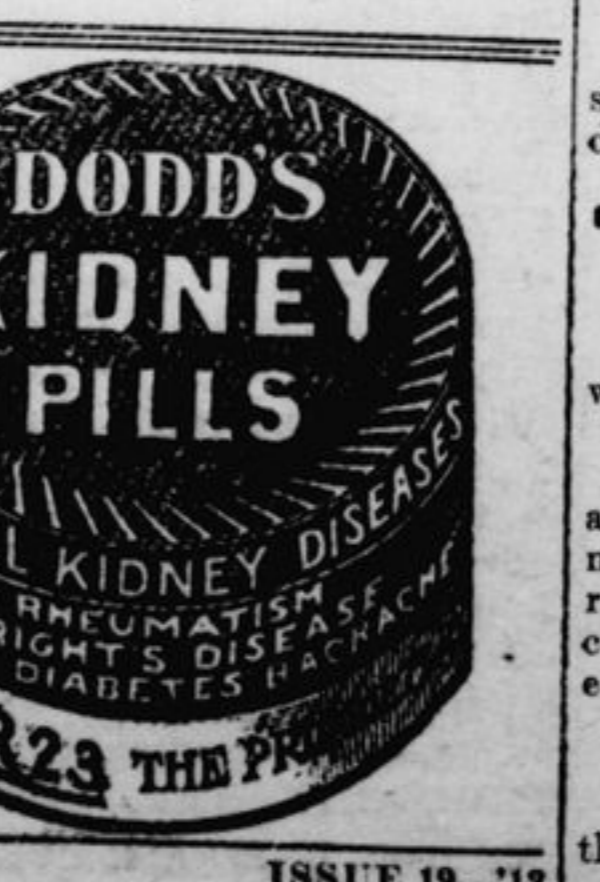

The Original Lemon. The lemon, which is going to be dear this year on account of a shortage in the crop, has a very clear history, says the London Chronicle. The lemon tree, of which there are forty-seven varieties, is particularly fertile, a good specimen in Sicily ripening as many as 3,000 lemons during the season.

EXECUTION BY DROWNING.

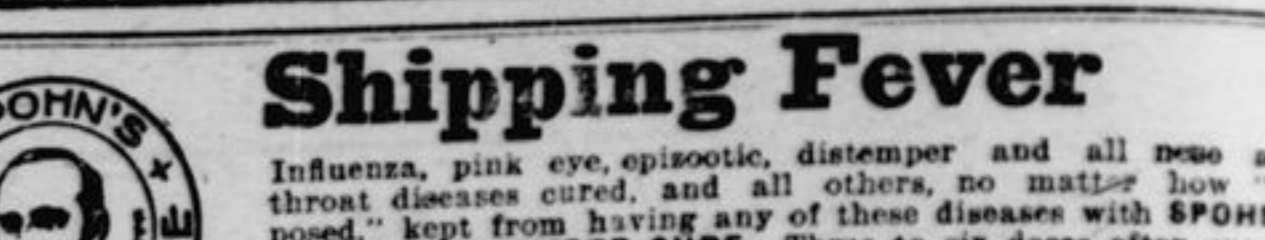
It Was Quite a Common Thing in the Middle Ages.

This mode of capital punishment has not long ceased in Europe, and is probably still in use in other parts of the world. As early as the first century of our era the Germans executed the meaner and more infamous criminals by plunging them in bogs and fens. In the Middle Ages execution by drowning was so common that grants of the right to inflict capital punishment ran "with pit and gallow." The pit or well was for drowning female delinquents, but the penalty was sometimes inflicted on men. The doom of the parrot was to be tied up in a sack and cast into the sea. Drowning seems to have been regarded as a mild form of the death penalty, for in the year 1596 a man convicted of theft and sacrilege was sentenced to be suffocated by water, "by the Queen's special grace." At this date the penalty had grown nearly obsolete in England, but in Scotland it survived until 1855. The last execution in Switzerland was in 1652, in Austria 1776, in Iceland 1777, and in Russia early in the eighteenth century. One of the most eccentric modes of inflicting the penalty was adopted in Saxony in the year 1734. A woman convicted of child murder was sewn up in a sack, along with a cat, a dog and a snake, and then thrown into the water and drowned.

NAPOLEON AS A SMOKER.

It has long been accepted as a historical fact that the First Consul was a great smoker, reference is made by M. Augustin Filon to some memoirs of Napoleon compiled by Gen. Once only he tried to smoke, but scarcely had he put the amber mouthpiece of a hookah in his mouth than he threw it away in horror and disgust with the words: "Take away that filth."

Napoleon then taxed tobacco. Nor did, if we may believe the same source, Napoleon ever take snuff, although we find it categorically asserted in most histories. He did, however, for he pretended to. He used to take, in order to alleviate a disorder of the stomach, a mixture of licorice and black sugar. This he kept in his waistcoat pocket, whence he would take a piece and lift it to his nose with the gesture of the ordinary snuff-taker, and then quickly put it into his mouth.

This, says the Westminster Gazette, is a somewhat startling variation from our customary pictures of Napoleon, who is generally portrayed as a habitual snuff-taker; and M. Filon himself deposes to having seen on the margins of an "Orlando Furioso," which was in the library at Longwood in St. Helena, and is now at Farnborough, the yellow marks of the imperial thumb, a thumb yellowed by incessant smoking.

But even this, as he pointed out, is not conclusive against the non-smoking evidence, for the thumb might as well have been stained by the mixture of licorice. Whatever be their ultimate truth, the non-smoking and non-snuff taking theories are delightful.
