Its size must, therefore, be proportional to that of the body. As a matter of fact, tall men have larger brains than small men without any corresponding excess of intellect; and the smaller female body, of course, calls for less physical brain energy and therefore does not require so large a brain.

In quality a woman's brain is quite equal to that of a man, and a time may come when that part of the brain devoted to mental functions will be larger in women than in men. Anyhow, she starts out in life with brain matter weighing 11/2 ounces more than that of the male child. Quite possibly she has only to use it as a man does to surpass him in mental power.

BIG DREDGE FOR CANADA.

Will Be Used to Make Deep Water Harbor in Hudson Bay.

Canada will begin this summer to make a deep harbor on Hudson Bay. 
