Children Become Farmers.

What promises to a most interesting experiment in Agriculture and which is now in its infancy is the rural school fairs in the townships of Egremont and Proton. Mr H. C. Duff is at the head of the undertaking and his assistant Mr. C. L. S. Palmer of Markdale has visited a great number of schools in each municipality and distributed plantings of grain and potatoes and settings of eggs. The making of plots and attending to them is the work of the children on their fathers' farms and the seed and eggs which are supplied from the O. A. C. Guelph and are No. 1 brand will become the property of the children after maturity.
Prizes will be awarded as in the rural fairs to the boys and girls having the best plots, the healthiest brood of chickens, etc. This will take place at the school fair which will be held sometime during the latter part of September or the first week in October at a central school in the township, not yet decided on.
