Mrs. Sterne was of a kind disposition, no one ever leaving her home either hungry or cold if she knew it. She was noted for all neighborly qualities and as wife and mother was much beloved. She was a member of the Presbyterian Church and a regular attendant when in health.

Her family surviving are Lizzie, Mrs. Lottie McDougall and Ethel, Mrs. D. Christie, Egremont, and her well-known son, Harry, merchant of Hopeville, and grandson, Will Atchison. A sister, Mrs. Rummel, Bolton, was present at the funeral with her daughters Mrs. Arthur and Mrs. Goodfellow, also Mr. Goodfellow and Mrs. Kevelly and Mr. Austin, niece and nephew of Bolton.

The funeral took place on Friday, 30th May, at Amos Church burying ground and was largely attended, her pastor, Rev. Mr. Kendall conducting mortuary services. The pall bearers were Messrs John M. Findlay, Geo. Lothian, James Snell, John Garson, Robert Renwick.
