Hot Weather Speaking.

A bye-election in July is no sinecure as the men engaged in the North Grey contest, both Liberals and Conservatives, are finding out. Both the work of organization and of speaking is rendered very difficult in the extremely hot weather of July. The flood of talk, however, shows no abatement. Both candidates are speaking every night and are covering the riding thoroughly. Several Cabinet Ministers including Hon. James Duff and Hon. W. H. Hearst are supporting Colin Cameron, the Government nominee and the leading Liberal member of the Legislature are lined up with Mr. McQuaker, Liberal candidate. A meeting a little out of the ordinary was that held on Wednesday, July 2nd, when Joseph Oliver, ex-Mayor of Toronto, appeared in Owen Sound in Mr. McQuaker's behalf. Controller McCarthy, of Toronto, is also going to speak at a meeting in Mr. McQuaker's interests. North Grey contests are always close but the Liberals hope to win by dint not only of hard work but of the splendid record of their party in the House and the Cabinet scandal which seems to be making a deep impression in North Grey. Mr. Proudfoot is to be in the riding on July 2, 3 and 4 and will tell the people his story at first hand. Mr. Rowell will speak in the constituency at a couple of meetings during the last week of the campaign. Other Liberal members of the Ontario Legislature are J. C. Elliott, J. G. Anderson, William McDonald, Sam Clark and C. M. Bowman.

Lloyd George and Hanna.

Quite a controversy has arisen over attempts to compare the Whiteley-Hanna scandal with the Lloyd George-Isaacs case in England. In both instances actions of Cabinet Ministers were under investigation but that is about as far as the analogy goes. It is a case of contrasts rather than of comparisons.

Mr. Lloyd George merely invested in American Maroonis, a concern not having business with the Government. His action was indiscreet but not corrupt and not criminal. Mr. Hanna took money from a Government contractor who at the time had a claim pending against the Government. This is a criminal offense. He also took the settlement of this claim out of the hands of the Courts and gave the decision without appeal to one man, I. E. C. Thorne, his confidential adviser, who, without taking evidence, awarded \$21,000 of the people's money to the claimant.

In England both of the accused ministers invited the fullest investigation. They facilitated it even to the extent of handing over their private bank books. In Ontario Hon. W. J. Hanna and Sir James Whitney for it is they who must take the responsibility, throttled the investigation, suppressed and struck out evidence and prevented free enquiry.

Who will say that the cases are parallel?

Glimpses of Niagara Camp.

My last budget dealt with our doings up to Monday night if I remember right. Our first duty on Tuesday morning was every one answering to what is called marching-in-muster roll call. Any who are not there to answer their names without a good reason forfeit a day's pay. The pay sheets were immediately sent down to complete by Wednesday night, of course this was impossible, unless one works all night and this being very un military here, was not to be thought of. However by early work on Thursday morning and foregoing the noon hours, were able to finish by 3 p. m. on Thursday, thus establishing a record as far as the 31st Regt. is concerned for speed. The reason is apparent: the officers kindly furnishing the nominal rolls of their Co's on representation of our Adj't Capt. Eaton, in short order.

Tuesday and Wednesday were occupied with drill of a preliminary nature in formation by companies Thursday being showery was a fine holiday for the men; in the afternoon company attack in extended order was practiced. The grass, on which they threw themselves out of sight of the enemy was still wet with the copious morning showers, and soon made them feel like wet dish cloths, and reminded one of sheep washing time. The forenoon was devoted to a short lecture on military law in the fringe of the attack, which was later developed into a concert of songs by the more musical of the officers.

Friday and Saturday were passed at the baths, where more attention and instruction in rifle shooting was given than ever has been. No markers are employed as such, but a third or half of a Regt. as the case may be, act as markers and register keepers, to the half of some other Regt., the latter changing places. By this plan no favoritism is as likely to be shown as by the old way. The extra pay to the markers of early days or some of it is now given to the two best shots of each Company in a \$3.00 and \$2.00 prize, many failing to qualify, they go back to day Monday for another chance, failing which 15c per day will be deducted from the 30c and \$1.00 per day that is given to 1st, 2nd and 3rd men respectively. 42 out of a possible 70 is what is required or an average of "magpies" at 100 and 200 yds, 7 shots at each.

The usual Sunday parade was held auspiciously and was a fine sight but utterly useless as no word could be heard.

Markdale Co. is at full strength lacking one man of the 42. This is commanded by Capt. Campbell, Deputy of Markdale, and Lieuts, Mercer and H. E. Duff of the Dept. of Agriculture of that town. The New Hanover Co. has 20 men and two officers, Capt. Snider and Lt. Musgrove, the latter a South African veteran wearing a medal with no fewer than four bars indicating the engagements he was in, married to a cousin of the Lothian family (nee Ethel Lister) gives him a sort of local touch with North Egremont. He is courteous and engaging and will no doubt make a successful officer.

The moving picture exhibits are a great drawing card, being viewed by hundreds every night, they are thrown against a large screen erected on the common, and are the subject of many amusing remarks by the soldier boys many of them being real bon mots causing peals of laughter at times. The pictures are of a heterogeneous character, embracing love and courtship, highway robbery, military drill, tragedy etc. They detract largely from the attendance at the Y. M. C. A. tent, but have the same object in view, keep the boys from the town and from booze. It does not entirely succeed as quite a slice of daylight intervenes between close of drill and the darkness when they can be shown.

The days yet ahead of us are already beginning to be counted, Major H. V. Rorke is here from Ottawa with the 31st, being Junior to Major N. W. Chisholm of Owen Sound, the latter stepping in on retirement of our fine Col. H. R. Cleland. The Regt. had a visit on Sunday from Major C. Sprule one time an Adj't. of the 31st. He is now teacher in this town, has a fine corps of cadets. The Sgt. mess is giving fine satisfaction having a colored chef who knows his business.
