SOME SEARCHING QUESTIONS

At a rousing meeting held at Brooke in North Grey last evening Mr. Wm. Proudfoot K. C. M. P., who spoke in the interest of the candidate, Mr. John McQuaker, propounded a series of six new open questions to the Premier, Sir James Whitney. The questions follow:

5. If you did not, why not?

6. Do you think it is in the interest of clean government that the Lieutenant-Governor should, in the circumstances, accept you and Mr. Hanna as two of his responsible advisers?

Durham's Juvenile lacrosse team lost the first home game of the series to Hanover last Thursday evening by the score of 7 to 5. Notwithstanding that the locals were defeated by the visitors, it was a fair exhibition of the juvenile brand of the game. From a spectator's standpoint interest lagged considerably at periods and the crowd did not give vent to the enthusiasm as was their wont in the days when the town boasted a more experienced team.

The first quarter was in favor of the home crowd, score 3 goals to 2. Hanover secured the first counter and the blue and whites dented the net for a trio of shots followed by a second tally for the visitors. In the second half Hanover took the lead and scored two points, while the locals notched one and made the score 4-4 at half time.

Darkness was commencing when the last period started and this prevented fast lacrosse. Play was even throughout the last half hour, but the German boys seemed more fortunate in their shooting. They gradually came in the lead and while the Durhams fought bravely to reverse the tide, their efforts were in vain.

Moorly in goal played a pretty game for Durham. McGill and Saunders shone in spots, while Allen at point cleared the flags on several difficult occasions. Hanover has a well-balanced forward line and their consistent combination and boring in on the goal gave them the victory. Howard McDonald made a satisfactory referee.

The Roll Call.

WILLIAM BROWN.

"In the midst of life we are in death." This saying was illustrated vividly Friday last in the case of William Brown. For two months he has been ill with pneumonia and kindred troubles for the most of that time being cared for at the home of his brother John of Holstein. Care and skill were bringing him around again and he was able to go for a while with his son near Orchard. Friday last he left Holstein by afternoon train for Durham to make his home with his daughter here, but alas! it was only for an hour or two for he died that evening, the excitement of travelling no doubt causing a heart shock that brought on the end.

Mr. Brown was born in Co. Tyrone, Ireland, over 71 years ago and came to Toronto with his parents and other members of the family when a boy. Later, with his mother, his father having died, he moved to Egremont in the pioneer days. Here he married Miss Jane Eddington and moved to Orchard where they lived till wife and mother died five years ago. After that he moved to Durham where he has lived almost continuously, the exception being some months in Holstein.

To this couple now both gone were born a large family; Mrs. McLean, Rouseau, Sask.; Oliver and Will of Paisley Brook, Sask.; Jno. of Wilcox, Sask.; Agnes in Rouseau; James in Orchard; Mrs. Collins, Palmerston; Mrs. Mel. Storey, Durham and Sadie. A daughter, Mrs. John Watt, died two years ago. Besides these chief mourners there is his well-known brother John, cattle buyer of Holstein, who is, as far as we know, his only brother.

He was buried on Sunday last in the family burying ground at Maplewood cemetery, Rev. Mr. Prudham conducting the services. Mr. Jas. Eddington, Owen Sound, a brother-in-law, attended the funeral.

It was our privilege to know the deceased of recent years and we can well believe the testimony borne of him by old neighbors as to his kindness of heart, his genial disposition and his worth in general as a man and citizen. We extend our sympathy to the family bereaved just as they were hoping his life would be prolonged.

JOSEPH LAUDER

On Saturday last Mr. A. W. H. Lauder of the Registry office, received a sad telegram announcing the death of his uncle, Joseph Lauder in Kamloops, B. C. The details of his last illness are not yet to hand.

Mr. Lauder was the youngest brother of Thos. Lauder, Sr., late Registrar, who died on 25th January last, and was the last of the well-known family of six brothers, most of whom took a prominent part in the early life of this country. He was born in Cumberland Co., England, in 1839 and came out to Canada with the rest of the family in 1851. About 45 years ago he married Matilda Moore, sister of Ben Moore, formerly well-known in town. She died some 12 or 13 years ago.

Thirty-five years ago he went west and took up ranching in Nicola Valley, B. C., in which business he continued for about 20 years. He held a government position for some time and for the last 12 or 15 years has lived retired in Kamloops, B. C. Three sons and four daughters, all living, and in British Columbia, remain to mourn his loss, the telegram being sent by his daughter Annie, a nurse, who visited in Durham some four years ago.

About 8 years ago Mr. Lauder spent most of the summer here meeting and fraternizing with many old friends made in the years he spent in this locality both before and after marriage. These will yet remember the steady and kindness of heart of this last member of the Lauder stock.

Mrs. Wm. Edge

On Monday last, 7th July, 1913, Mrs. Wm. Edge passed away at the age of 52 years, after a lengthened illness due to anaemia. It had been known that she was delicate health, but it came as a startling and painful surprise last week when it was learned that the illness was going to prove fatal.

Mrs. Edge was Miss Mary Gordon Lawson, daughter of the late Wm. Lawson and sister of Robert and Wm. Lawson, near town and of Mrs. Hopkins. She was born at Hutton Hill and lived some time at the farm north of town before her marriage to Mr. Edge some 27 years ago. Her removal will make a marked gap in the community where her good neighborhood and Christian character were recognized and valued, but it is in her home where her loss will be most seriously felt and most sincerely mourned. Besides her sorrowing husband, a daughter, Miss Valerie and son, Herb., will long cherish her memory.

Interment is taking place to-day, Wednesday, in Trinity Church burying ground, Rev. Mr. Hartley conducting the services.
