The Department is spending \$10,000 on this exhibit, so it will be seen they are in deadly earnest. This should easily be one of the most interesting exhibits of the Fair.

PLANING MILL BURNED.—At a few minutes before two o'clock this Wednesday morning the alarm of fire was given by factory whistles and town bell, which speedily brought out the fire brigade and scores of citizens. Hill's big store house, formerly used as a cash and door factory, was by this time a mass of flame and beyond the possibility of being saved, so two streams were directed upon the surrounding buildings in turn, a frame house belonging to Henry Bros., also their tannery, a cement building, a large warehouse belonging to Arm. Strong and Mrs. Ricketts' dwelling across the street. By well directed efforts on the part of the brigade these were saved. Hill's warehouse contained about twenty thousand pounds of wool, a carload buttes boxes, cutter, buggy, boat, laundry machinery, automobile, etc. The wool was mostly covered by insurance but there was none on the building. The origin of the fire is a mystery but it looks like the work of an incendiary.—Markdale Standard.
