Brown-McLeod—That the assessor be paid \$10.00 for services equalizing union schools Nos. 1 and 14, Artemesia and Euphrasia.—Carried.

Graham-Brown—That a Danlop be paid \$52.35, being statutory amount of his claim for sheep killed by dogs, as certified by J M Davis and E Brodie.—Carried.

Caswell-Graham—That D Genoe be paid \$2.00 for road over his field to gravel pit on lot 34, con 9.—Car.

McLeod-Brown—That J I Graham be refunded \$1.19 for amount advanced by him to pay repairs to rock crusher.—Carried.

Brown-Graham—That in reference to claim for damages presented by Mr W J Boyd, Mr Caswell is appointed to investigate and make report to this council as to condition of road where the alleged accident is said to have occurred.—Carried.

Graham-Brown—That in reference to the verbal application of Archy Stewart et al to make a deviation from original road at lot 152, con 2, S W the Revue and Mr Caswell are instructed to examine the proposed deviation and do what they consider necessary for the best interests of the municipality and upon their approval by-laws be passed to establish the new part and dispose of the old.—Carried.

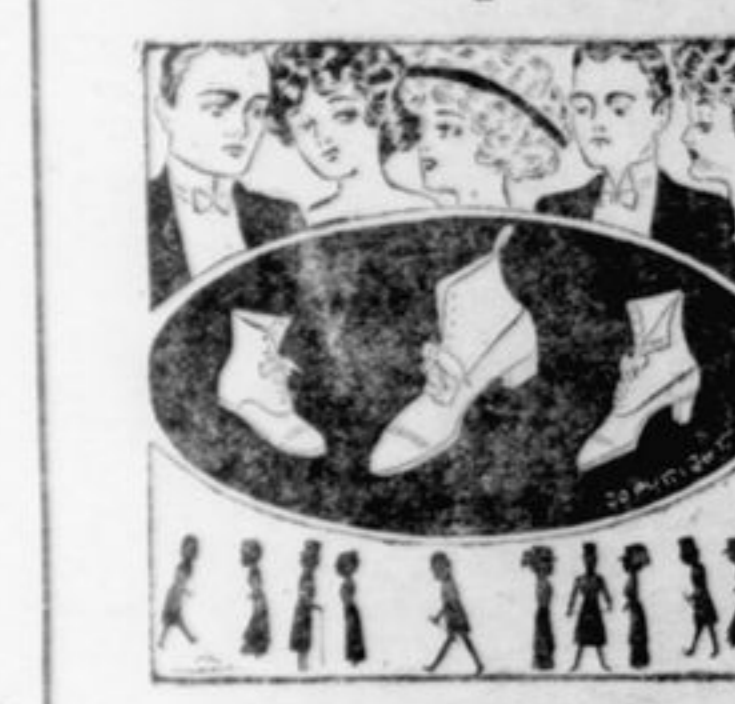
