This report shows expenditure of \$176.50 over Comr's division. —Com fees \$6.00. Comr Robb's report shows expenditure of \$207.75 throughout his division. Gravel in this division is scarce and hauling is costly. —Com fees \$3.00. Comr Robb's report shows he has expended \$207.75; grading, graveling and ditching are prominent in this report. Com fees \$6.00.

It is compulsory under the Public Health Act 1912, to appoint a Sanitary Inspector. By-law No 277 was passed. The name of W P Ellis, Holstein, was inserted therein as Sanitary Inspector.

The tenders for construction of Davidson's bridge were opened and each gone into with minutest detail which finally resulted in the following motion.
