Dr. Hutton, of Durham, attended church here yesterday and it reminds us of olden times when the Dr. was a useful member of the church here.

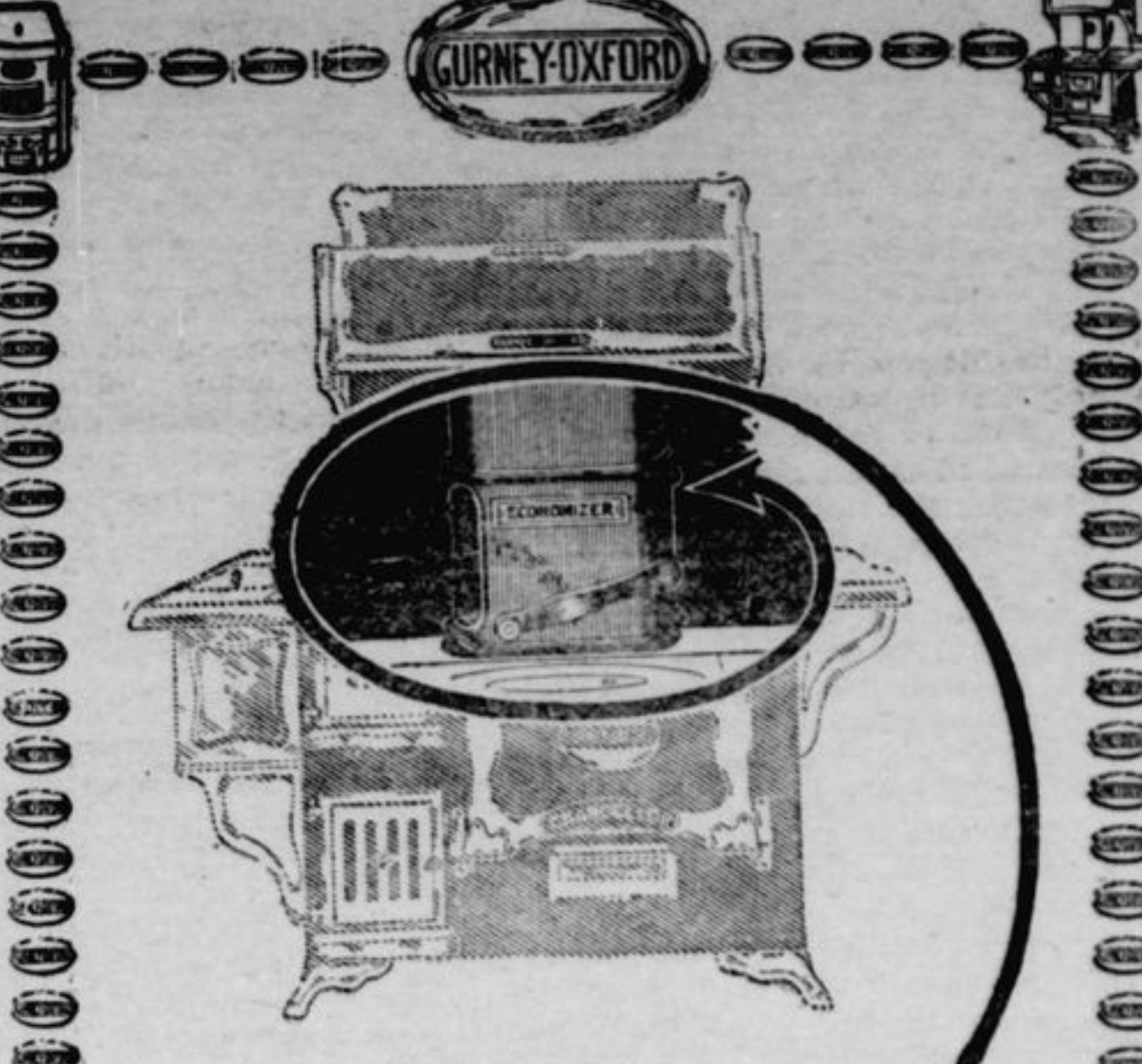
John McMillan, south line, had a number of sheep worried by dogs a few days ago.
