A Gruesome Find.

While in search of stray cattle on Monday last the twelve year old son of John McFadden came across the skeleton of a man in a swamp across the road from their farm, which is a mile from Markdale. Other members of the McFadden family viewed the remains, the authorities were notified and on Tuesday morning Coroner Bibby of Fleisherton, accompanied by Dr. Egoj of Markdale, visited the spot and found the skeleton of what appeared to have been a man of medium size and probably sixty years of age. They considered that death had taken place fully a year ago, as the clothing fell into pieces when handled, an evidence of being thus exposed for a considerable length of time. Of course, not a particle of flesh was found on the bones. The body had evidently lain undisturbed, had on a suit of blue serge with striped vest, grey overcoat, gormsey and wool shirt, black felt hat, pair good faced boots not much worn. There was found in the pockets a pair of spex with cover, pipe and matches, cathozine, tooth pick, piece of comb. The Coroner considered an inquest unnecessary, so the remains were buried where found, by Chief McCutcheon. There is no clue to the identity, neither has any person of the community disappeared mysteriously, so that the case falls to even arouse any suspicion as to what it might be or the cause of death. It was certainly a gruesome find.

The above is taken from the Markdale Standard, Yesterday The Times in conversation with a Markdale man who said that it was possible the skeleton was that of Alexander Graham, a rather peculiar character who had been about Markdale about a year ago and who had disappeared. His going had aroused no comment as he was a lone man without kith or kin apparently. The supposition is that he went to the swamp and died there because of his mania was of a religious turn and he had attracted much attention by publicly praying on the streets and predicting dire calamities for Markdale.
