School Fair in Egremont.

As we intimated in a former issue this new departure, introduced by Mr. Duff, District Representative of Agriculture, stationed in Markdale, is to be tried in Egremont on September 13th, the first School Fair in the County of Grey.

It is to be contributed to by eleven schools and no pains or expense will be spared by the Department to demonstrate the object and possibilities of this branch of Agricultural education.

The Science of Agriculture will no doubt be, in a few years, one that will appear in the curriculum of all Public Schools and the Government is gradually getting the public agencies to do it, by means of School Fairs.

At present there are but two townships in Grey Co., interested in the project, one being Egremont and the other, Protton. It is the intention of the Department to introduce them to other townships before long.

The School Fairs are under the supervision of the District Representative, and the instructions are issued through the teachers in the spring and the children plant what they choose at home. Then in the fall, September, the fair is held at the school-house. The crops, such as barley etc., that the children plant are ranged along with anything else they may have chosen to prepare for the fair, such as poultry, collection of weeds, collection of insects, insect work and plant disease, mounted and correctly named with common name, cooking, sewing and flowers.

Prizes ranging from ten cents to a dollar are given for the various entries, and without taking into account the education a child interested will receive, very pecuniary rewards, in within reach of the successful ones.

No entry fees are charged to the children exhibiting. All exhibits must be the work of the property of the exhibitor. All exhibits of poultry, grain and potatoes must be the product of materials supplied by the Department.
