Canada, the Empire and the World in General Before Your Eyes.

Canada. The Canadian Northern Railway expects to operate grain trains from the Northwest to Quebec this fall.

Edmonton is likely to have a sensation in the investigation of the police department administration.

Canada's Internal Revenue returns for July totalled \$1,851,333, as compared with 1,779,009 in the same month of last year.

A Branford Realty Company purchased a twenty-three-acre property, the Oakwood subdivision, for \$49,200, and will erect houses there this fall.

More than half the issue of the city of Toronto 4 per cent. bonds bought by N. W. Harris & Co. of Montreal has already been privately disposed of to United States and Canadian purchasers.

The Detroit River Tunnel Co. owes the city of Windsor \$10,000 in taxes for 1913, and has failed, for some unknown reason, to pay, which is causing the members of the Council much concern.

The new amendment to the judges' act will mean the retirement in a short time of ten county court judges, eight of them in Ontario. Under the amended act a judge retires at the age of 75, on full pay.

COMMENTS ON EVENTS

Nothing Wrong With Canada.

On his return from England, Sir Edmund Walker, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, expresses himself very hopefully on the money situation, and in an interview stated that there was no need of anxiety among reputable Canadian business men engaged in ordinary business transactions.

There is nothing wrong with Canada," said Sir Edmund. "The whole trouble is with the money situation. The rate of gold has increased, but not sufficiently to keep up with the world-wide profits of the last few years. The tightness in the money market is due mainly to the fact that the Bank is diverting money from commercial channels. The only reason why Canada has been singled out for criticism, went on Sir Edmund, "is that she is the most prolific borrower, and therefore attracts most of the attention when capitalists begin to discriminate in making their loans."

Canadian credit conditions are the least hurried, and interest in Canadian investments has not flagged, but investors in England are obliged to discriminate more carefully and to charge a higher rate.

Baroness Macdonald of Earmacraid is the only British woman who holds a title in her own right. The Baroness is the widow of Sir James Macdonald, created a peer in 1891, on the death of her husband, in consideration of his public services during the Boer war.

Her marriage to the Canadian lawyer, Sir James Macdonald, member of the House of Commons, was a matrimonial union of convenience. Lady Macdonald makes her home in England, but continues to take an interest in the welfare of the country, and has reached the age of seventy. Her husband was a prominent Canadian statesman whose wife was still living.

One of the greatest medical congresses now in session in London discussed the remarkable growth of the temperance movement in the United States. He referred to the improved habits of the army officers, who were now expected to be as temperate as the average citizen.
