Scotch Isle Rulers Nearly Independent.

[The following sketch of Scottish Islands, the first home of many of our readers, will prove interesting to them and their descendants.—Ed.]

Writing the other day about the godson of the Duke of Argyll, the Maclean of Loebale, lord of the Isle of Mull, with its 45,000 acres of forest, glen and sporting waters, recalls that the coast of the United Kingdom is studded with a number of such little islands, the property mostly of impoverished nobility, about which there is little if anything known in this country. Let me describe the most noted of them.

The proprietors of these island kingdoms, while owing allegiance to King George nevertheless are monarchs of all they survey. In some instances the British parliament has no power to tax these island estates without the consent of their owners, nor can any one reside on them without their permission.

Perhaps the principal of these island properties is Lewis, in the Hebrides, whose present ruler is Major Matheson. Lewis boasts of an area of 457,221 acres and a population of nearly 30,000. It is the largest British island next to Ireland. It has figured largely in Scottish history, and the doings of that noted warrior chief, Ruarid Macleod, who once ruled it, would fill volumes. Over and over again British kings have dispatched soldiers to take the island. After a few months occupation however, they invariably retired beaten.

At one time the island fell into the hands of the Dutch, but eventually they also were driven out. The island boasts of extensive "lochs" where magnificent fishing is to be had, while some parts of it are mountainous, Meallasbhal and Ben More, the two highest peaks, towering 1,800 feet above sea level. Every where there are numerous antiquities and Druidical remains. The owner's residence is a magnificent old castle, close to Stornoway, the principal town.

Members of the royal family have stayed here, including the late King Edward. The principal industry is fishing, and in season the girls of Stornoway go all over Scotland packing herring. Their language is pure Gaelic.

Arran is interesting. In these northern waters too, is Arran, another interesting island, ruled by the Marchioness of Graham, wife of the eldest son and heir to the Duke of Montrose. It was as Lady Mary Hamilton that the marchioness inherited the estate from her father, the late Duke of Hamilton. The island is 19 miles long and 10 1/2 in width with an area of 168 square miles, and his had a romantic history.

Along the cliffs of the south coast there are several large caverns, one being known as King's Cave. Here Robert Bruce hid himself for some time, while it was from Brodick Bay that Bruce sailed to Carrick on his expedition for the recovery of the crown. There are many interesting ruins, too, such as Lochnraze Castle, once the residence of the Scott kings.

Then there are cairns, standing stones and stone circles. A few years ago several stone coffins were found in Brodick Castle. The owner's residence is on the site of the old and historic structure, but it has been rebuilt in Scotch baronial style. Situated upon the N W shore of Brodick bay, its position is an exceptionally fine one. In 1902 when cruising in these waters, King Edward paid a visit to the castle.

The Isle of Bute in the Firth of Clyde is said to possess the mildest climate in Scotland. Its owner is the Marquess of Bute, who holds it over a kingdom of 49 square miles in extent and boasting of a population of 11,000. The scenery in some places is very picturesque. There are six lakes, the largest being Loch Fod two and one-half miles long. Here in a cottage lived Keen the great actor, and also Sheridan Knowles, the famous dramatist.

Among the antiquities of Bute is Kames Castle. The principal tower is Rothesay, in the centre of which stands Robert's Castle, dating back to the year 1098. It is here that Robert III died. From an early period Bute was more or less subject to the Norwegians, who held the castle.

Not far from Bute is the island of Islay, now governed by Hugh Morrison, brother-in-law of Lord Granville. This is the richest and most productive island of the Hebrides, and was the principal residence of the Macdonalds for many years. Early in the seventeenth century it passed from the MacLeans to the Campbells, and afterward to the Morrisons. It has a length of 25 1/2 miles, a breadth of 19, and a total area of 246 square miles. The population numbers 7,000.

The Duke of Argyll included in his possessions not only Tyeze Island, but also the island of Iona, the most sacred and historic spot in all Scotland. Its history began in the year 563, when St. Columba, leaving the shores of Ireland landed upon Iona with 12 disciples. Having obtained the grant of the island, he built a monastery. This was repeatedly attacked and destroyed by the Norsemen and the monks suffering martyrdom during these fierce forays in 1208 a new monastery, as well as a manny, was founded by the Benedictines, and the ecclesiastical remains, for which the island now is famous, are chiefly of that date.

Strathcona Buys Island A little to the south of Iona lies Colonsay, belonging to Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, who purchases it some years ago from the heirs of the late Sir John MacNeill. The island is eight miles long and from one and a half to three miles in width. Its relics consist of a number of standing stones and an extensive house cave. The owner's residence is Colonsay House, which has been the seat of the MacNeills since the sixteenth century.

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In the Outer Hebrides is the Island of North Uist, belonging to Sir Arthur J. Campbell-Orde, who served with distinction in the South African war. No one can reside on the island without the owner's permission, and no taxes can be levied without the consent of its ruler. It has an area of 76,000 acres and a population of nearly 4,000. The eastern half of the island is cut up by lochs and water courses, so as to have the appearance of an archipelago. Bonnie Prince Charles is said to have landed on North Uist and hidden in the heather.
