

SPRING WHEAT 192,517,000

Ottawa Places Canada's Grand Total of Wheat at 2 1/2 Million Bushels.

A despatch from Ottawa says: A bulletin issued by the census and statistics office of the Department of Trade and Commerce gives preliminary estimates of the yield of spring wheat, rye, oats and barley, as compiled from the reports of correspondents upon the appearance of these crops.

Of spring wheat the average yield per acre is provisionally placed at 27.24 bushels per acre, which upon an area of 8,950,000 acres, makes the total yield of spring wheat to be 192,517,000 bushels. This quantity added to 18,481,800 bushels of fall wheat, as published last month, gives the total production of wheat at 210,998,800 bushels, compared with the final estimate for 1912 of 199,236,000 bushels, and for 1911 of 215,351,000 bushels. The yield per acre in 1912 was 29.59 bushels for fall wheat and 20.37 bushels for spring wheat.

Oats, with an average yield of 40.99 bushels per acre on 9,646,409 acres, gives a total production of 395,341,000 bushels, as against an average yield of 39.25 bushels and

a total yield of 361,723,000 bushels in 1912.

Barley, a yield per acre of 31.05 bushels, and a total yield of 44,400,000 bushels, as compared with an average yield of 31.10 bushels and a total of 44,014,000 bushels in 1912.

The estimated yield of rye is 2,425,000 bushels for 127,000 acres, being a yield per acre of 19.06 bushels as against a total of 2,594,000 bushels in 1912.

For the three northwest provinces the total yield of spring wheat is estimated at 188,015,000 bushels, oats 244,135,000 bushels, barley at 28,156,000 bushels, rye at 612,000 bushels and flax at 15,056,000 bushels, as compared with a total yield in 1912 for spring wheat of 183,322,000 bushels, oats 221,857,000 bushels and barley of 29,671,000 bushels.

The general condition of the live stock is very satisfactory, being expressed in percentages of a standard of 100, representing a healthy and thrifty state, as 94.27 for horses, 91.37 for milk cows; for other cattle 93.54, for sheep 90.41, and for swine 94.53.

FEWER WORKING DAYS LOST.

Trade Disputes Were Fewer in August Than in July.

A despatch from Ottawa says: There was a considerable decrease in the number of trade disputes in Canada during August as compared with the number during the previous month and corresponding month last year. There were also fewer employees involved and fewer working days lost than during July.

The department's record shows that 6,896 employees were affected by disputes during August, as compared with 8,124 during July, and 6,500 during August, 1912. The number of working days lost during August was approximately 109,820, compared with 185,867 working days lost in July, and a loss of about 108,000 during August, 1912. Nine disputes actually occurred during August.

SUFFRAGETTES ARE BUSY.

Fourteenth Century Country House Set on Fire.

A despatch from London, England says: A desperate attempt by a Suffragette "arson squad" to burn down Penhurst Place, the historic fourteenth-century country seat of Lord de Lisle and Dudley at Tunbridge, Kent, was made on Tuesday. The inmates of the great mansion, awakened by the cracking of wood and by clouds of smoke, found the framework of a number of windows ablaze. A working party of household employees soon succeeded in extinguishing the flames. Two women were seen fleeing across the lawn in front of the building, and a large amount of suffrage literature was found in the grounds, while heaps of rags soaked in petroleum were discovered in several places.

BULGARIA AND TURKEY.

Now All Is Peace Between the Late Combatants.

A despatch from Constantinople says: Official announcement is made of the settlement of the frontier question between Bulgaria and Turkey in Thrace. The frontier starts at the mouth of the Maritza River and ends north of Midia, on the Black Sea. Turkey retains Adrianople, Demotika and Kirk-Kiliseh, while Bulgaria retains Tirnova, Mustapha Pasha and Orkani. An agreement in principle has been reached on the subject of nationalities.

U. S. STEEL COMPANY.

Has Applied For Permission To Do Business in Manitoba.

A despatch from Winnipeg says: The United States Steel Products Company, a New Jersey corporation, has applied for permission to do business in Manitoba. While the application does not so state, it is believed that this organization is the selling corporation of the United States Steel Trust.

PENITENTIARY AFFAIRS.

Board Has Been Appointed to Make Investigation.

A despatch from Ottawa says: It was stated at the Department of Justice on Thursday that the board appointed for penitentiary investigation, consisting of Dr. Hetherington, G. McDonald and J. P. Downey, has been instructed to look into the conduct of affairs at Kingston only, and that the inquiry will be held in camera.

CONCERN ON EVENTS.

Old-Age Pensions and Pauperism.

In one respect Britain's old-age pension system has fully justified its most sanguine expectations. Pauperism among people over 70 years of age has declined 50 per cent., while in many rural districts a pauper of that age is almost unknown. Glorious relief to aged people has declined 50 per cent.

Some critics of the system say that these figures have little meaning, because what the state saves in one direction it pays out in another. It makes but little difference whether a man is a state pensioner or the recipient of the alms of the poorhouse, provided the specter of the poorhouse produces an effect quite unlike that of the prospect of a pension.

Old-age pensioners are supported by local taxation, while the pension system rests on national finance. Communities have some relief of heavy burdens if they even feel the benefit of the circulation of the money received by the pensioners. The weekly sum is only \$1.25, and in many cases this means starvation. An early increase in the rate is quite desirable, whereas a return to the old plan is entirely out of the question.

Americans Learn From Britain.

George W. Perkins, of New York, who has been abroad since June, returning through the British Isles, says that people abroad are interested in the political situation in New York. He is a disorganizer of the world and it ought to be strained out of any country.

"It would be well," said Mr. Perkins, "if we could learn from the British here and teach our people to build roads. There has been \$30,000,000 spent on highways in the state of New York in the past few years and what have we to show for it? The roads are in a state of ruin, built to last and not torn up by automobiles in a few months."

"Fifteen years ago there were about 20,000 semi-trucks in England; now there are upwards of 50,000. The British do not continually prosecute and persecute by the Government, but are fostered and encouraged to build the steel manufacturing districts; there is great activity in the building of steel mills, and they are contented, although they are not so well housed as the workers in this country. The British have built many miles through England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales, and they believe I saw as many as 100 new houses or buildings of recent construction."

"Another point on which the English people are much more liberal in their views than the Government and people of this country is that of banking. There is one bank in London which alone has deposits of \$1,000,000,000. In this country one-third of the total deposits of all the banks in New York together. Yet there is no city money monopoly or anything of that kind in England."
