His remains were interred at Swinton Park cemetery amid the sympathy of a large concourse of friends, even the grave being made less forbidding by the consileration of members of Swinton Park congregation, who arranged bunches of flowers, ivy in festoons all about the edges of the grave. The I. O. F. had a service at the grave, Donald being a valued member of their Society. His death was due to blood poisoning, the result of being bitten by black flies.

Travelling in that long wearisome journey in excruciating pain he was tenderly cared for by a stranger on his way to Montreal, who instead of going east to his home came round by Toronto to care for the suffering boy and even offered him money if he needed it in his extremity. This good man, of the Jewish faith, held to his charge till assured that the McKinnon boys who met the train were trusty and capable friends. In fine contrast was this to the heartlessness of his employers who allowed a boy that had to be helped on the train to go hundreds of miles unaccompanied.

Swinton Park.

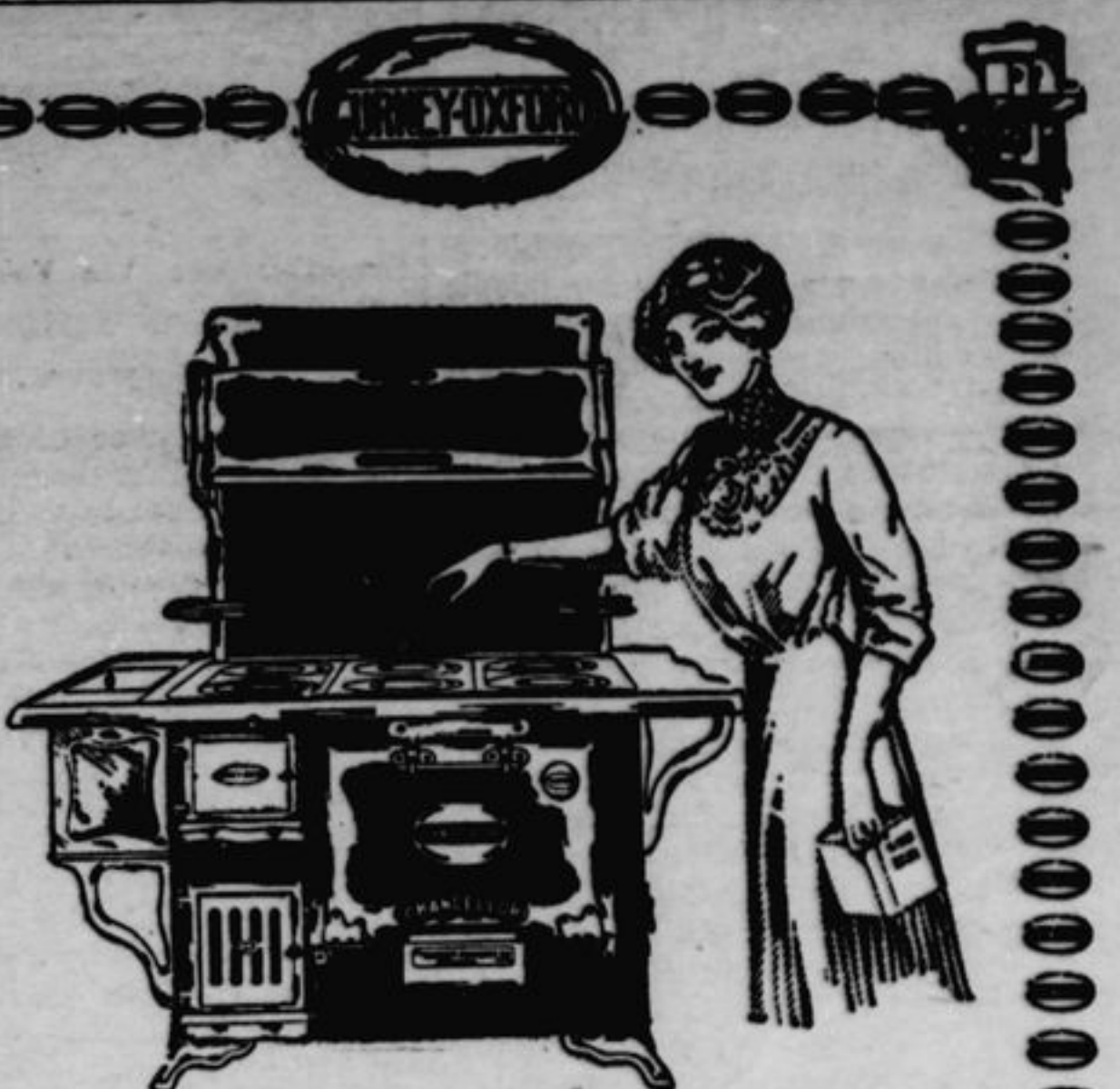

The young man was on a surveying gang in New Ontario and contracted blood poisoning. He was moved to Toronto for treatment, but it was too far advanced and proved fatal. The remains were taken to his home in Priceville on Friday night and the funeral to Swinton Park cemetery on Saturday was the largest funeral ever seen in the place. The funeral service was in the house and was conducted by the Rev. J. Buchanan and Rev. J. A. Leese officiating at the grave, after which the I. O. F. buried their beloved brother in their usual manner. The entire community sympathize with Rev. and Mrs Matheson and family in their bereavement.
