Progressive Regina

Dear Review Readers: As we are rather crowded for time on leaving Regina, our letter is somewhat curtailed this week. After speeding over mile upon mile of about perfectly level prairie, usually covered with wheat in stook, and much already threshed, the compact and well built city of Regina looms up before us and here we most pleasantly spend a few days.

Regina is the great distributing centre of the west, and every implement concern on the continent except two, has branches or works here. The city is well laid out, all the streets meeting at right angles, the east and west ones termed avenues, and all paved except in new districts. Scarcely a trace of the disastrous cyclone 15 months ago is to be seen.

With its 50,000 citizens and the promising future ahead, Regina property especially in business district and leading residential is very highly priced. Over 700 new residences, it is said were erected last year. The Sherwood Co., who are completing a large dept. store on Albert, at present not a business street, purchased the ground from Hon. Geo. and Mr. James Brown for \$125,000 and another dept. store pays a rental of \$1600 monthly.

In a tour through the beautiful parliament building to the south of the city, we came across Jos. Burnett, who left Durham a number of years ago, and now occupies a government position in the telephone dept. Climbing many flights of stairs to the top of the tower, we obtained a delightful view of the city at our feet and the country for some 30 or 40 miles around.

We also met with Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Keislie, formerly of Holstein, who is engaged in tailoring here, and called on another old Holsteinite, Robt. Mickleborough, at present ill in Regina Hospital. A few other South Grey friends were prevented from seeing through absence or lack of time.

It was our greatest pleasure to spend an afternoon in the entertaining company of Jas. Brown, who spent much of the past year at his old home in Holstein. We motored through all parts of the city, around the Parliament building lands and to Government House on the west side, where we enjoyed a call on H. Governor and Mrs. Brown, Mrs. Patric and her niece, Miss Anna Caras, are at present residing with their brother Jas, who has visions of taking a trip to Australia and New Zealand for the winter. They have recently returned from a visit on the Pacific coast. We learn that Mr. J. H. Brown who spent some time here after leaving Holstein, is now at Humboldt, Sask., and purposes going into business there.
