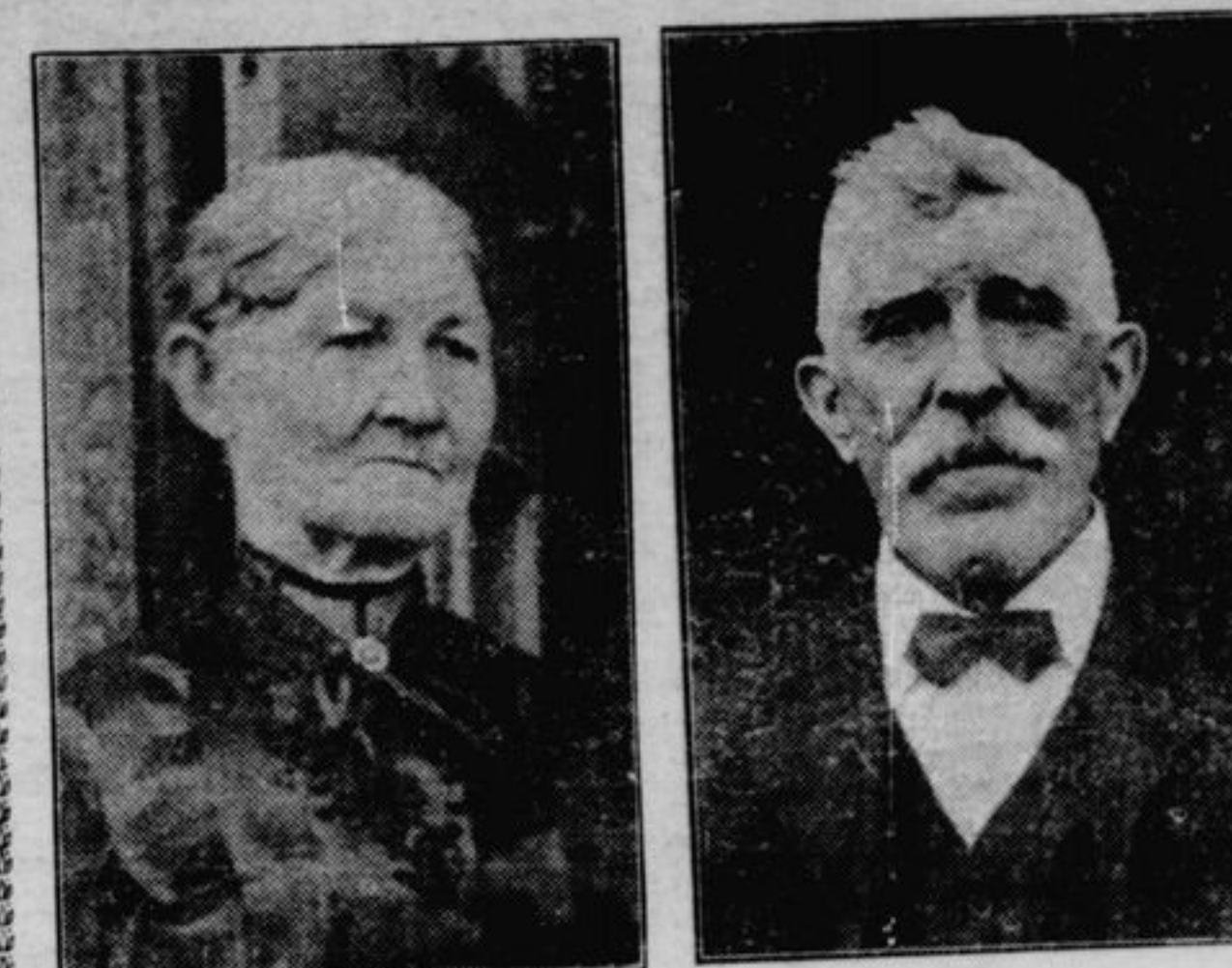

McArthur—Black—At Spring Creek Farm, Glenelg, on Oct. 1st, 1863, by the Rev. Chas. Cameron, pastor Presbyterian church, Priceville, Mr. John McArthur to Miss Isabella Black, both of Glenelg township. One of those happy events which does not often come to the life of a man or woman, took place on Wednesday, Oct. 1st, at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. John McArthur, Spring Creek Farm, when they celebrated the fifty-third anniversary of their marriage. Six children, five sons and one daughter, were born to Mr. and Mrs. McArthur, five of whom, four sons and one daughter are living. Of these there are also seven grandchildren, nine being present on the occasion.

A pleasant feature of the event on Wednesday was the presence of six who witnessed the ceremony fifty years ago: Mrs. Archie McArthur, sister of the groom and her son Donald; Mr. Chas. McArthur, brother of the groom; Mrs. James Campbell, of Buffalo, N. Y., sister of the bride; Mrs. Malcolm McMillan, niece of the groom and Mrs. Donald McArthur, Sr., sister-in-law of the groom.

After all had assembled Rev. J. A. Matheson, pastor of the Presbyterian church, Priceville, called the company together in the spirit of prayer, to order and after prayer sat down to the table weighted down with many good wishes in honor of the occasion. After all had done justice to the inner man, Mr. Matheson, acting as toastmaster, spoke of his long acquaintance with the aged couple and of the many good qualities they not only possessed but practised and read the following address:

To Mr and Mrs John McArthur:
Dear friends,—
We, your children, grandchildren, neighbors and friends have gathered together in the spirit of God and therefore assembled to celebrate with you and make glad your hearts on this your Golden Wedding anniversary.

Another Successful Milestone Passed.
While the attendance at this local fair has been larger, the interest in it and excellence of the exhibits has seldom, if ever been surpassed. The morning was not very promising and may have deterred some but it brightened as the day advanced and ended fine.

The government judge in sheep and cattle wished it known that what came under his hands was of rare excellence, sheep especially and fit to appear at Toronto shows. The same remark would apply to much of the exhibit.

The Directors will soon have to consider enlarging their hall for it now has a congested appearance, though brilliant in the ample display of the products of field and home. Judge Rowe, of Durham, thinks the display of bread and pastry classes could not be surpassed for excellence and as usual the root and vegetable exhibits compel the thought that the locality is eminently suited for this purpose. Butter was in abundance and judging the forty or fifty samples must have been difficult.

The presence of the Owen Sound Kilty Band was a delightful feature, they were generous with their music too and would be welcomed again.

The hospitality of the citizens was never more in evidence as many Durham visitors can satisfy, but we are warned by the staff that space is precious and trust that the prize list and our fine correspondence will give a vivid picture of a fine show.
