Priceville was originally named after Surveyor Price, who surveyed the town plot in the early part of the fifties. An old highlander some forty eleven (51) years ago, who indulged freely in the good quality of the usquebaugh (whiskey) was hobbling around saying in his own language 'Am faicheadh duinne mise rabh air an daorach an am Praceville or did any one ever see me drunk before in Priceville.' This was the highlander's pronunciation of our town. While we were getting our mail in the town, we often had our mail mis-sent to Priceville or Riceville, but now we get it regular at the gate post.

Going back again to the early times many a sore head would be the result next morning after a good jollification at a gathering of some kind suitable for the old times the 'ray previons, for whiskey was only two pence a dram or glass and often 10 or 12 would be treated for a quarter. No wonder heads would be reeling next day. Generally in the days of old there were three or four whiskey shops or hotels we should say. These were all licensed from \$20 to \$90 per annum, but we cannot touch for the business done, taking them as a whole but one thing sure that selling whiskey to the poor fellows who spent their time and money in partaking of it, but these old times are only mentioned as historical, for they are past and gone, being years ago and those people that were the partakers then, are, if living, old men and can be found in their own dwellings quietly enjoying the change from long ago. What have we now? One hotel only and no strong drink sold. The new proprietor, Mr. Joseph Black, we are assured, will strictly adhere to the rules laid down before him, in regards to running a strictly Local Option hotel and we hope he will be patronized by all classes of people for these places are of necessity for the traveling community. An old sinner who probably wasn't getting along as well as he should with his wife said 'after all women are only necessary evils.' Some think that hotels are the same necessary evils. The late proprietor McGraith conducted a good temperance business in town also, so did Mrs. Butters during her term under Local Option.

The late disaster caused by fire is a severe loss to the town as well as to the loser of the most of his belongings. We can trace back mostly all the fires that occurred for the last forty five years. The block between the post office and McKechnie's store was burned and the ruins of the old D. A. Ghent & Co's general store can be seen yet. The two grist mills, one the old stone mill and then the fine roller mills of the late Robt. McGowan was burned. Dixon's store below the late Mrs. Ausum's was also destroyed by fire. On the opposite side the wagon shop of the late Wm. McMillan homestead. He sold his farm to Mr. Jackson from Dundalk who has moved in.

Historic Iona Desecrated.

Many of our readers will be interested in the following sketch signed by the Marquese de Pontenoy, whose appreciation of the halo surrounding the old ruin will meet with the sympathy of all true Scots:

Visitors to the sacred Isle of Iona, possessed of any sense of art, or of reverence for the historic past, will be profoundly shocked by the vandalism restoration of the glorious old ruin of the cathedral of Iona, the cradle of Christianity of Scotland. It has not only been re-roofed, but also fitted up with Neo Gothic brasswork, woodwork and other twentieth century furnishings, from the church furniture emporiums, and which offend the eye, not only by their aggressively modern Philistinism, but also by their glaring anachronism.

That Scots should have desired to use the old sanctuary of what was once the Gaelic counterpart of England's Canterbury cathedral and Westminster Abbey is comprehensible. But it passes the imagination how they could have had so little sense of propriety as to convert it into what looks like a brand new Presbyterian church - utterly out of place among its wonderful environment.

When the late Lord Leven and Melville left a quarter of a million dollars for the restoration of Holywood chapel at Edinburgh, with the idea of its being used once more as chapel of the ancient royal Order of the Thistle Edward VII and his chief advisers declined to accept the legacy, on the ground that any attempt at restoration would impair the picturesque beauty of the exquisite ruins, and that to repair them would constitute an act of unpardonable vandalism.

The sovereign's attitude in the matter met with universal approval, both at home and abroad.

That the ruins of the cathedral of Iona, which mean so infinitely more to every son of Scotland, than Holywood chapel, should have thus been permitted to become the prey of the inartistic restorer, is simply inconceivable.

It is only fair to state that the present duke of Argyll is in no sense of the word responsible for this crime against art and archaeology. It is necessary to mention this, since Iona until a few years ago belonged to the duke of Argyll. The late duke, however, greatly to the indignation of his family, made over all the ecclesiastical remains on the island of Iona to the trustees of the Presbyterian church of Scotland, of which he was a shining light, his main object being to prevent them from falling into the hands of either the church of England or of the church of Rome.

For the present duke has since his marriage to Princess Louise, become a member of the Anglican church, while his nephew and next heir, Niall Campbell, a tall and extremely good looking young fellow, is wither on the very brink of conversion to Roman Catholicism, or has already become a convert. After Niall Campbell, who is unmarried, there come his cousins, Douglas Campbell, married to a daughter of the late John Laurence, of New York, and their ten-year-old boy, Lord George Campbell and his son Ivar, attached to the British embassy at Washington and then the entitled estates would pass to the Roman Catholic branch of the family, namely, the Campbells of Lochon.
