The Council met Oct. 11th pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: Pace & Scott, Civil Engineers, &c.; Colin McArthur, J. Y. Moffat, certificates of sheep killed by dogs; Hill Bros., account for grad. necessities; Sam. Wright, claim for sheep inspection; the reeve J. A. McMillan and Geo. E. Peart, reports on special jobs; J. J. White, claim for sheep killed by dogs; Geo. E. Peart, report on balance of ward appropriation. By-law No 539 for the appointment of collectors was read a first and second time.

On motion of Young and Lindsay, cheques were issued as follows for special jobs in repairing bridges and washouts, viz: to Geo. E. Peart, repair of O Hanley's hill, \$9.00; to the reeve, repairing bridge at lot 34, on 2, N. D. R., \$30.15; to J. A. McMillan, for special jobs, \$25.00 and to Geo. E. Peart, for balance of ward appropriation, \$106.75. Gravel accounts were paid as follows: E. J. Sullivan \$1.05; George Goodwill \$3.70.

McMillan—Peart—That David Keys be paid \$300.00 on contract of bridge at lot 6, on 2, N. D. R.—Car.

McMillan—Lindsay—That William Fallaise be exempt from statute labor for 1913 on account of infirmities.—Carried.

Young—McMillan—That Hill Bros. be paid \$3.00 for necessities for grad.—Carried.

Lindsay—McMillan—That Thos. Nichol be paid \$6.00 for committee work, phone messages and train fare to Owen Sound and that Geo. E. Peart be paid \$1.00 committee work.—Car.

J. Y. Moffat, Colin McArthur and Sam Wright were paid \$1.00 each for inspecting sheep killed by dogs.

Young—Peart—That John J. White be paid \$8.00, being two-third value of sheep killed by dogs as certified to by Samuel Wright.—Carried.

Peart—Lindsay—That P. J. Haley be paid \$140.00 for damages to himself and engine and that this covers all claims in full.—Carried.

McMillan—Young—That the selectors of jurors be paid as follows: the reeve and assessor \$3.00 each and the clerk 4.00.—Carried.

McMillan—Peart—That By-Law No 539 appointing collectors be now read a third time, signed sealed and engrossed on By-law book.—Carried.

Peart—McMillan—That the Treasurer be paid \$3.85 for postage and stationery.—Carried.

Lindsay—McMillan—That the Treasurer accept the sum of \$6.50 for old timber of bridges sold by the reeve.—Carried.

Young—Lindsay—That Commissions be paid as follows: J. A. McMillan and Geo. E. Peart \$6.00 each, Joseph Young \$4.00 and the reeve \$2.40.—Carried.

Possible Entrance Changes. Inspector N. W. Campbell has stated to the Review, that there may be several changes occurring in the High School Entrance examination of 1914 and that in a great measure it depends on the school teachers themselves whether their pupils can avoid writing on additional subjects to this annual test.

During this year the four continuation schools at Durham, Markdale, Flesherton and Dundalk have been termed High Schools and in each district an Entrance Board has been appointed holding the jurisdiction of the Entrance examination. If they see fit, this board has the power of promoting any students that they consider properly qualified into a high school without an examination of any kind. However it is very unlikely that this step will be taken. Again the Board has the authority of placing an examination on the group 1 subjects of the Entrance course, comprising History Hygiene, Art and Nature Study and this course may be taken and adhered to unless these subjects are more efficiently taught in some rural and town schools. In the past there has been no test on these subjects and in some schools, the teaching of them has been greatly neglected. In lieu of such an extra test being taken, it would behoove all teachers to see that intending students are given thorough course in group 1 work, especially the subjects of Hygiene and History. Only pupils from these schools which are rated low in this work, would of course be put to this test.

The libel law of Australia is the greatest in the world. He who is sued for libel there must not only prove that the accusations he published were true but also that to publish them was for the public benefit. The explanation lies in the fact that Australia was practically colonized by convicts, whose descendants are now the leading families, the richest, the most influential, the most intelligent, the most respected. And yet these excellent people have in the past been at the mercy of every editor. Let them get into the smallest squabble or dispute with some editor, and the man would bring them into general ridicule and contempt by printing their ancestry, by showing that Sir John Smith's great grandfather had been sent out for robbing an old woman of \$7 or that Judge Brown's great-aunt, while employed as a servant girl, had tried to poison her master's son with whom she was in love. The present law prevents taunts that a spiteful editor might easily print about such things, for of course it cannot be for the public good to print the statement that Judge Doe or Dr. Roe had a father or an uncle that was a convict.

A DROP OF P'S—Persons who patronize papers should pay promptly, for the pecuniary prospects of the press possess a peculiar power in pushing forward public prosperity. If the publisher is paid promptly and his pocketbook kept plenteous by prompt paying patrons he puts his pen to the paper in peace, his paragraphs are more pointed; he paints his pictures of passing events in more pleasing colors, and the perusal of his paper is a pleasure to the people. Paste this piece of proverbial philosophy in some place where all persons can perceive it.

ADDITIONAL LOCALS. A CUSTOMS OFFICE FOR CHESELEY.—Mr. Ross, an officer of the Public Works Dept. was in town on Tuesday taking measurements for an addition to the new Post Office for a Customs Office. Coming on the eye of a by-election the promise of a Customs Office here has all the earmarks of a wholesale bribery scheme to purchase the votes of the electorate of Chesley. Wm. Haliday will in all probability be Customs Officer. The foregoing is from the Enterprise and we learn from a private source that six new mail boxes have been stuck up in town last Friday.
