Coroner's Inquest

That Mrs. John Reay came to her death by being struck by engine of train 2026, going west from Durham on night of October 28 1913. We find further that the engineer did not show proper caution in approaching this crossing, and that he might have stopped his train to avert this accident had he realized a collision was going to take place. We find that the crossing at which the accident took place is a dangerous one and that the railway company should be asked to put the crossing in a safer condition. We also instruct coroner to forward a copy of this verdict to the chairman of Railway Commission.

Talk of Electric Radial.

There is considerable talk rife in the municipalities of Guelph and Owen Sound over the proposed construction of an electric railway, starting at Guelph for its southern point and proceeding northward to the Georgian Bay. One proposal is to start a line from Hespeter, thence touching Preston, Guelph, Elora, Fergus, Arthur, entering Grey Co., near the towline between Proton and Egremont townships, continuing northward, crossing the U. P. R. line at Markdale and terminating at either Meaford or Thornbury. The county town's lighting plant is to be used as a power source. Another report has it that the line will pass through Mount Forest, Durham, Owen Sound, thence eastward to Meaford. In either case, if the line was built a new stretch of country, greatly needing transportation facilities, would be opened up, although Durham would naturally strongly favor the route through this town and sever I citizens have expressed the hope that Mayor Black and his council will make an energetic move to have this boon placed at our own doors. Other nearby towns have already been communicating with the executive forces of the proposed railway, giving every inducement.

Sunday School Convention.
