Rowell's Opinion.

Mr Rowell, in an interview with the Star says: "An out of over 20 in the Conservative majority, namely from 539 to 287, in a campaign of a little over ten days against the combined forces of the Government and the liquor interests is very gratifying," said Mr N. W. Rowell to The Star when asked for his opinion on the East Middlesex result.

"Among the most encouraging and significant features of the fight in East Middlesex were: First, that a number of Conservative temperance men came out on the platform and in the press as strong supporters of the policy for the abolition of the bar. They rose superior to party affiliations in support of a great issue. I believe that this is but the commencement of a movement in which the temperance men, irrespective of party, will stand by their principles in supporting us in endeavoring to give effect to the policy of which they have been lifelong advocates."

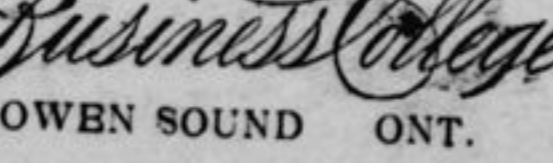
