Great Britain and Germany.
So far-reaching are the interests of the Great Powers in these days that any agreement between two nations in any quarter of the globe is liable to involve Europe in disastrous consequences. Happily, there were no danger points as far as opportunities for amicable adjustments, which may serve to promote pleasant relations between one country and another, and so pave the way to a better mutual understanding. The settlement of many outstanding questions between France and Great Britain pointed the way towards the Entente Cordiale, and there seems no reason why the same course should not lead to a similar happy result as regards relations with Germany. It is, at least, satisfactory to learn that an Anglo-German agreement concerning the Baghdad Railway has been arrived at the settlement to follow the main lines of the Russo-German agreement already in force, and that between France and Germany, which is still under discussion. A fair measure of compromise is essential in dealing with such delicate questions whose ultimate solution is of little value towards maintaining the world's peace.

VALUABLE AID TO FARMERS

Association Being Formed In the Provinces to Aid Department of Agriculture

A despatch from Ottawa says: Considerable work has been done this season by the Live Stock Branch of the Department of Agriculture in carrying out the Government's aid to agriculture policy. To improve the quality of stock and encourage mixed farming, the Government has this summer placed in various districts pure-bred male horses, cattle, sheep and swine. Owing to delay last season, the work of the department was hampered by the late period at which the work of distribution of pure stock was commenced. Even with this handicap, there has been distributed, principally in the West, 150 pure bred bulls. In the West, Northern Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces already 500 pure bred sheep and swine have

Good Roads Movement.
The Province of British Columbia was the pioneer in effective work for good roads and now Manitoba is following suit, says the Ottawa Journal. At a recent meeting at Minnedosa, Manitoba, the Provincial Premier made the important announcement that it was the intention of his government to inaugurate a policy that will make for the betterment of the highways of the province; that will be of advantage to the people, and that will be a further evidence of the progressive nature of the province. For the purpose of improving rural highways, the Legislature is to be asked to vote \$2,500,000. It will be charged to capital account, and will be utilized to the best possible advantage by the efficient head of the highway department of the province. As a result of the investigation which the Ontario Highway Commission is now making, it is quite expected that the government will amplify the good roads policy which they have been encouraging in recent years. Quebec is also falling into line, and none too soon.

Horse Meat Cured in Quebec.
Science and time have shown that many apparently simple things are in reality wells of hidden meaning. This applies to a supposedly nonsensical nursery rhyme concerning the antics of a cow who used to be known as a burke. One has only to inquire as to the market price of beef to find the connection. It has been pointed out to the statement that Canada has a plan for curing horse meat, situated a few miles from Montreal. On the beautiful road between Longueuil and Boucherville, a branch of a famous Swedish factory has been established. This firm—Merrum's—is now operating on a large scale, and is producing a horse meat which is not only correct, but is also a delicacy. The sale of it is as yet in its infancy in Canada. The factory at Longueuil was started but two or three months ago, the operators and assistants are Swedish and their work is of the highest quality. The plant as yet is but a small one, killing now, as stated by its manager, out thirty head of horses a week. It is proposed, however, to build a larger one, and to produce a hundred or fifty tons of horse meat, with comfortable and suitable other buildings in which one hundred horses may be housed.

One reason why foreign-made playthings are so much desired is that they are made in a country that engages the cheapest kind of labor, that of children, so to phrase an old saying, "the children of Germany take pleasure in making what the children of America take pleasure in buying."
