Hampden Anniversary

Marked by excellent Sunday services, followed by an unusually brilliant evening of speech, recitation and song on Monday night, Hampden Presbyterians recorded another success in their series of successful anniversary gatherings.

On Sunday Rev. Mr. Mason of Carleton Place was the preacher and his discourses were greatly admired. The text for his morning sermon was from the last clause of 1st Cor 11: 33, which bears reference to the sacramental rite of breaking the bread on the night previous to the anniversary of Christ.

Hampden people always secure a splendid array of speakers and entertainers to cater to their audiences and on Monday with the Rev. Mr. McLean first in the chair and later, Mr. H. H. Miller, a program of exceptional merit was listened to.

Inspector N. W. Campbell spoke on the advancement of the present era in the way of inventions and compared this district to-day as it appeared 35 years ago when he first taught Hampden boys and girls how to read and write.

Mr. H. H. Miller told of the present prosperity on the farm and cited changes that have taken place in their conditions during recent years. He told them of Harry Bowman, the Mt. Forest lad who led the champion steer at the Chicago Show, stating that more honor went to the feeder than to the man who owned the beast.

Mr. W. J. Riesberry of Hanover gave a splendid address in narrative style. It was original and spicy and found its own way to fame with the audience. Electricity and electric radiata were the instructive topic of an address by Mr. James Derby of Hanover.

DURHAM TO ASK FOR HYDRO ELECTRIC POWER

At the last meeting of the town council for the present year, on Monday night, the following important resolution was presented and passed:

Calder-Lloyd-Clerk be instructed to write Hydro-Electric Commission on 1860 horse power delivered at Durham and the time of delivery if adopted by the ratepayers of the town.

Other motions carried were: Calder-Furneaux-That Fire Brigade be paid the sum of \$32.50 for their services on 17th Sept.

Calder-Lloyd-C. J. Furber & Co. be refunded sum of \$38 on their taxes for year 1913 as per agreement entered in by this Council with the said firm being an agreement that the said firm would only pay school rate on their assessment.

Calder-Lloyd-That financial statement be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer and 100 copies of the statement be printed for distribution.

Lloyd-McKechnie-This Council tender a hearty vote of thanks to the Mayor for his able manner in presiding over the deliberations of the council for 1913.
