What Taxed Food Means.

A shipment of 1750 cases of butter, 278 carcasses of veal, 1250 carcasses of mutton, is on the way from New Zealand to Canada. At Vancouver the consignees will have to pay duty as follows:

17,500 cases of butter, 60 lbs. per case, 1,050,000 lbs. Canadian duty 4c lb. \$42,000.00 278 carcasses of veal, averaging 60 lbs., 16,680 lbs. Canadian duty 3c lb. 500.00 1250 carcasses of mutton, average 45 lbs., 56,250 lbs. Canadian duty 3c lb. 1,687.50

Total duty on this food... \$44,187.50. Aim at \$50,000.00 the Canadian people will have to pay before they can consume this food! To the British consumer this amount would be saved. No wonder the cost of living is high with such samples as the foregoing and another fact that Canadian flour can be bought in England at from 50 to 92 cents a barrel cheaper than it can be bought for in the Dominion, where the wheat is grown and milled.

It is high time the free food policy advocated by Sir Wilfrid Laurier was introduced into this country.
