Struck by Train near Holstein

By what seems almost a miracle or intervention of Providence, Mr Geo. Keith, a Proton township farmer, escaped death on Saturday night. As it is, he is well as ever to-day, but possibly a wiser man than hitherto.
In company with Mr Wm. Yake, another farmer from the same township, he was enroute home from Mt. Forest. Turning east at McDougall's Corner, they seemingly lost their way in the hizzard which was raging. Mr Yake got out to enquire the way at a farm house and in his absence, Mr Keith drove on and turned northward on the railroad track. Here was danger. The night express nearly three hours late was steaming on and caught up to the horse, which judging by the marks left on the track, was acutely aware of its danger and was galloping furiously.
Arriving into Holstein at 12 50 p. m., Engineer Watt discovered on the front of his locomotive, a smashed buggy top and seat, a man's hat and driving whip. It was the first intimation of an accident. Passengers also stated that they had not felt the least jar which might have resulted from a collision. Backing up, the train crew found Mr Keith drenched about 15 feet from the track and a quarter mile still farther back was the remains of a dead horse and a buggy splintered to matchwood. Still further back they met Mr Yake coming northward.
Arriving a few minutes later in this village, it was discovered that Mr Keith was practically uninjured, notwithstanding that he lived through a smash-up and a thrilling half mile drive on an engine plow, which few men could survive. The trainmen state and it is the general opinion here that neither man were sober.

What they Say of Dr. Marsh.

The following extract is taken from the Peterborough Examiner and is an evidence of the esteem that Rev. Dr. Marsh is held in by the people of that city. The article was written previous to the night of the lecture and continuing it gives a splendid synopsis of the speaker's address. We will not quote this portion, believing that in due time, Dr. Marsh will favor us with an address on astronomy and that it is possible that he will be instrumental in organizing a society along this branch of science of which so little is known here.
'This will be an advanced address for the thinkers and students of Peterborough. Dr. Marsh is one of Canada's distinguished astronomers. He has been honored by the parent society by having conferred on him the degree of doctor of science, and he has honored the society by reason of the knowledge he has acquired.
In his intensely interesting address he drops the plummet of his knowledge far into the secrets of nature's great laboratory and he breaks up the truths he brings to the surface into mentally digestible pieces with the easy flow of a natural eloquence.
The learned doctor will unfold to us the various layers of the sun and explain the great waves of heated gas that look so much like flames during a total eclipse.
Some days after this address was given a great farrow gathering was held and a presentation made with many kind words from representative men. Among those Judge Huyck spoke in praise of Dr. Marsh. 'He has been a benefit to the whole community; he had been not only an educator but an inspirer.' The editor's closing words were 'his lectures and his personal work will be very greatly missed. The community is losing one of its most prominent and useful members in Dr. Marsh's departure.'
