His wonderful popularity through all these years is a mystery to some, but his own history and power of management, friendships and respectability, his loyalty to those associated with him in office has won scores of admirers, or we never know him to desert a friend or associate. His days of trouble or public discontent prevailed. His ability as a canvasser has been the envy of many an opponent, but few could resist his appealing, but perhaps, more than anything else, his great spirit, his big-hearted youthfulness, his enthusiasm for well-ordered roads raked free from stones, have endeared him to the hearts of the electors, so that now they come to look upon him as a permanent official. 'Twill be a glomy day for old Glenelg when this unique character drops from the Council chamber, but the best wishes of a wide circle of admiring friends are that he may long retain his vigor and enjoy the fruits of his labors. - Standard.
