

FOR TECHNICAL TRAINING

Three Million Dollars Is the Suggestion to Be Made to the Government

A despatch from Ottawa says: One of the most important questions to which the attention of the Government and Parliament will be drawn this coming session will be that of the desirability of embarking upon a policy of technical education. What the commission proposes, briefly stated, is that three million dollars of federal money be devoted per annum to technical education. The idea is to divide two and a half millions of this between the provinces upon the basis of population, and to devote the other half million per annum to the creation of a Central Technical Institute, where experts could be developed who could be loaned to any municipality making a start in the technical training of the young.

The commission also recommends that a portion of the money be devoted to the establishment of county schools throughout the country where scientific farming and higher ideals of citizenship could be imparted to the sons and daughters of Canadian farmers.

The commission believes that action should not be delayed a year longer, and it is supported in this view by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, many leading boards of trade, the Dominion Trades and Labor Council, and the farmers organizations throughout the country. In Parliament the proposals have many prominent supporters on both sides of the House. The present Government has taken just as sympathetic an interest in the work as did the former Administration, and if there are any differences of opinion when the matter is brought up in Parliament, it will be only in regard to detail. The other day Premier Borden gave the delegates representing the Trades and Labor Council who waited upon him the impression that the recommendations of the commission would be considered without delay.

POTATO DISEASE IN STATES.

Canada May Place An Embargo on Them.

A despatch from Ottawa says: A report that it is the intention of the Government to place an embargo upon American potatoes in retaliation for the action of the United States authorities for declining to allow Canadian potatoes to go into that country is denied in official circles. The claim is made that there is just as much potato disease in the United States as in Canada, and that the object of embargo is to keep the American market for the potato-growers of Maine. A peculiar feature of the situation, however, is that while Hon. Martin Burrell has not decided upon a policy of retaliation he has been practically advised to do so by Dr. Gussow, Dominion Botanist, who has been looking into the potato situation both in the United States and Canada.

BRITAIN IS PROSPEROUS.

Big Increases in Imports and Exports for 1913.

A despatch from London says: The British Board of Trade returns for 1913, issued on Wednesday, showed that the aggregate of imports into the United Kingdom amounted to \$3,845,169,795 and the exports to the United Kingdom to \$3,175,585,670. The respective increases were \$121,966,640 and \$180,780,029 over 1912. The most notable decreases among the imports were: Cotton \$48,342,245 and grain and flour \$14,841,730, while live animals and foodstuffs increased \$93,821,775. The largest increases in exports were coal and iron \$35,370,910 and iron and steel \$28,630,075.

POLICEMEN STOLE FURS.

Montreal Foreman is Also Charged With Receiving Stolen Goods.

A despatch from Montreal says: Following the arraignment on Wednesday of Claude Vachet, who a few days ago, while a constable attached to the central police station, is alleged to have stolen a fur muff and cape, Constable Leconte was taken into custody on a charge of having received stolen goods. Later in the day Foreman Alphi Gaynor, of the Ontario Street fire station, was taken into custody on a charge of theft. Fire Foreman Gaynor is charged with stealing a quantity of gloves and other articles during a fire in Ontario Street early Tuesday morning. He will be arraigned on Friday.

ROYAL VISIT TO IRELAND.

The King and Queen May Go to Dublin in July.

A despatch from London says: King George and Queen Mary are already considering a visit to Dublin in July of this year. It is understood that the King will conform his movements, so far as Ireland is concerned, to the advice of his Ministers, and will adopt no course that will hamper any of the political parties with which the government of the island is a matter of concern. The opinion in well-informed quarters is that there will be no extended sojourn in Ireland until the present period of tension has been definitely ended.

GREAT VICTORY ACHIEVED

Dr. Lazarus Barlow, the London Surgeon, Reports Astonishing Results in Cancer Fight

A despatch from London says: The London Times on Thursday published a statement concerning radium treatment of cancer at Middlesex Hospital, which, it declares, records the most important advance yet achieved in the campaign against the disease. The statement is made by Dr. Lazarus Barlow, under whose direction the cancer department of the hospital admits only inoperable cases, that is, he said, cases which have passed beyond the aid of the surgeon.

From June to September, 1912, twenty-four such cases were admitted, and in the same time there were twenty-four deaths, the mortality rate being one hundred per cent. From June to September, 1913, sixty-eight cases were admitted, and in that time thirty-six deaths occurred, and thirty-two patients were in so favorable a state as to be discharged from the hospital, an unprecedented event. Most of these patients are now going about their daily work. In one or two cases a recurrence has taken place, but Dr. Lazarus Barlow hopes that with fuller knowledge of the action of radium recurrences will be prevented.

Dr. Barlow said it was possible in some cases that they at present admit not give a sufficient powerful dose of the remedy. If 150 milligrams of radium were buried in a cancerous tumor it simply withered and disappeared, but it was suggested that occasionally a few cells were left unharmed. These afterwards caused a recurrence by becoming active.

He has not so far published the details of his results because he desired to follow up the history of his cases a little farther. Time was required to substantiate the remarkable results achieved and no one should talk of an absolute cure until his results had been substantiated by time. Nevertheless there could no longer be any doubt as to the immediate effect of radium upon cancerous tumors.
