No Tariff Relief

Big Interests and not the Farmers of Consumers Have Ear of Government.

Hon. W. T. White, Minister of Finance, has declared in the House of Commons that in his opinion under-production is the main cause of the high cost of living in Canada.

Liberals, while admitting that under-production is one of the causes of high prices, do not stop there, but have sought a series of remedies, based upon known conditions.

It is peculiar that our honorable friends who are so generous to agriculture, who expect such magnificent results from that industry, should have records so specifically so far as the records to date show, every request that had been made by the authorized voice of agriculture in this country.

It is to be noted that in this demand the farmers declared their willingness to lose the "protection" which their products now "enjoy."

Train No. 27 now leaving Toronto 8.45 p.m. daily, arriving Sudbury 5.55 a.m. will be discontinued between Toronto and Sudbury after Saturday, January 3rd.

Train No. 26 now leaving Sudbury 10.45 p.m. daily arriving Toronto 8.00 a.m. will be discontinued between Sudbury and Toronto after Sunday, Jan. 4. Toronto—North Bay sleeping car will be discontinued with this service.

Commencing from Ottawa Jan. 5th and from North Bay, Tuesday, Jan. 5, a local train will run between Ottawa, Broad St. Station and North Bay, daily except Sunday, leaving Ottawa 1.30 p.m. arriving North Bay 10.10 p.m. arriving North Bay 7.45 a.m. arriving Broad St. Station 3.45 p.m.

Train No. 5, leaving Montreal, Windsor station 9.45 a.m., Ottawa Broad St 1.30 p.m. daily for Pt. Arthur, Ft. William and Winnipeg will be withdrawn after trip leaving Montreal Dec 31st, 1913, until March 2nd, 1914 when through service will be resumed.

Train No. 6 leaving Winnipeg 6.15 p.m., Fort William 8.45 a.m., Pt. Arthur 9.03 a.m. daily, arriving Ottawa, Broad St. 3.20 p.m. and Montreal, Windsor St 7 p.m. will be discontinued after trip Jan 3rd from Winnipeg and January 4th from Ft. William and Pt. Arthur. This train will resume service March 5th, 1914, from Winnipeg and March 6 from Ft. Arthur and Ft. William.
