Farmers Co-operating

In his report as Secy. at the annual meeting of the Grey County Board of Agriculture on Jan. 31st, Mr. H. C. Duff spoke of the labor problem. Already some men were asking for assistance, but it is not known as yet what will be done. During the past year a stock census of the county was prepared and while it is not yet complete, it is beginning to fill a long felt want. Now any one can get pure bred stock without going out of the county. The list will be published in pamphlet form for distribution among the farmers of the county. Considerable interest was taken in the account of the fruit exhibit at Toronto and the winnings of Grey's stock at Guelph.

"The hardest feature of Co-operation is the appointment of proper managers," said Mr. T. H. Binnie in address on that subject. He must be an honest shrewd business man who had the proper understanding of farm produce and the proper grading of it. The old method of co-operation was the selling shares to get capital. The new scheme is to take the promissory notes of the members to the bank and get the capital there. In this way no interest is paid on the money unless it is in actual use and the members have a cash tied up in the business. Mr. J. W. Blyth, of Varney, gave a short account of the new co-operative organization which is being worked out by the Grange.

Mr. F. C. Hart, of the new Co-operation and Markets branch, gave an account of the work of the Farmer's Clubs in Waterloo county. He also spoke of the line of work which the new branch hoped to follow during the next year or so.

The following were elected to the Executive for 1914: Chairman, Mr. Browder, Ravenna; Secy., T. H. Binnie, Pricerville; Messrs H. C. Duff, Dolphin, Breen and Moffat. Delegates were present from Bognot, Hanover, Glenelg Centre, Kilsyth, Markdale and Strathairn.

A resolution was passed asking the Dominion Government to remove the duty on repairs to traction ditching machines.

Honored and More Promised

Ex-Mayor Col. D. C. McKenzie, of Fort Frances, known to old Durhamites as "Dave" McKenzie was significantly honored two weeks ago by his fellow citizens on retiring from the Mayorship after 3 years' service during which the place grew from one to four thousand in population with great industrial expansion. The advance freely gives him credit for the progress. The presents consisted of a hunting case, watch, chain and charm with bells that strike the hours, half hours and quarters, a monogram of the ex-mayor on front and the coat of arms of the town on the back with inscription. The illuminated address concludes as follows:

"It is the wish of all that the hours and days marked off by this gold time-piece may be few indeed before you are called to serve your fellow Canadians in a broader field of public endeavor, and when the call comes the unfailing geniality, the skillful diplomacy, the unerring judgement and the unwavering honesty which has characterized your administration of municipal affairs will not be forgotten by the electors of Fort Frances."

Presbyterians call a Minister

Splendid Financial Showing

10 Feb. 1914.—The annual meeting of the Presbyterian congregation was never more largely attended than today, easily explained perhaps by the extra inducement of the interesting process of calling a minister.

Insp. Campbell was voted to the chair in the absence of a pastor and after devotional exercises took up the various reports embodied in the Annual Statement. The Session report contained a fine letter from Rev. Dr. Farquharson, written by request as a farewell message while yet the congregation was without a pastor. It breathed tender exhortations and warm good wishes to the congregation "that oft refreshed me during these fourteen years with their mutual faith and love and that showed such unfeigned kindness to me in my weaknesses." The report in closing says: "The Session hopes that wise and prayerful counsels will prevail and that the utmost harmony will mark every step in the choosing of a pastor."

This hope must have been considered by the Session as practically fulfilled by the unanimity displayed in the voting for a minister. Rev. S. M. Whaley, B. A., of Tivastock, who preached on 1st February received on the first vote such a second vote was given to the minority of two who had voted in the minority the choice was made unanimous. This was a most happy culmination of a situation that is sometimes fraught with anxiety.

Returning to the Session report it told of a roll of last statement of \$50 and after balancing the gains and losses through death and removals, it now stands at \$50.

National Prohibition by 1920. Only Two Ridings in Grey Co.

Rev. P. K. Dayfoot, Gen. Superintendent of the Baptist Sunday School Association of Ontario, conducted services here on Sunday last and at 8.15 p. m. a non-denominational meeting was convened in the Methodist Church to be addressed by him and by Mr. Aitken, the student supplying the Presbyterian pulpit for the day, on the subject of Temperance. There was a fair attendance for a stormy night.

Rev. Mr. Prudham was chairman and introduced Mr. Aitken first and after he had given his message, Mr. Dayfoot gave the main address of the evening. It was full of pungent facts relating to the present day standing of the temperance movement and tracing that movement through the various steps of prohibitive legislation up to the present Local Option victory, when over three-fifths of the province is "dry."

He referred to the recent great victories of the Canada Temperance Act, especially in Huron Co. and said the wonder in Welland was not that it carried, but that under the conditions existing they dared to try at all.

The movement to abolish liquor selling was making astonishing progress in the United States and he thought Canada should join in the slogan they were adopting "National Prohibition by 1920."

Laid to Rest.

Friday last the remains of the late Mrs. Torry were laid to rest in Durham cemetery, amid many evidences of sorrow and respect. A brief service was conducted in the home, Rev. Mr. Prudham assisting, after which the remains were taken to Trinity church, where an impressive and appropriate service was conducted by deceased's pastor, Rev. W. H. Hartley. The church, appropriately draped for the occasion was filled to the door, some 300 or more turning out to pay the last tribute.

The speaker took his text from II Timothy 4: 27, where the aged St. Paul says "I am ready to be offered" will knowing that the bonds he was enduring would soon lead his captors to accomplish his death. He drew many practical lessons from the uncertainty surrounding human conditions and the necessity of being always ready to meet the last enemy, and if possible, with the courage and optimism of St. Paul. He mentioned a striking fact, that of 18 deaths in his parish, within the past year, 10 of these had been sudden, without warning, and possibly some who had died away from home might have gone equally unlooked for. The great lesson impressed on all was "Be ye always ready" to be offered.

Beautiful wreaths covered the coffin; from Trinity Church Guild, from friends of her son Fred and of the family in Walkerton, from the Women's Institute, of which Mrs. Torry was a devoted member, from the Fire Brigade, of which Mr. Torry was so many years chief and a spray from Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Wright. The pall-bearers were Thos. McAnulty, Hugh McDonald, Michael McGrath, Geo. Fur-neaux, W. Wakefield, C. Ramage.
