The Week in Provincial Politics

(Special to the Review.)

Woodstock, Feb. 7th. Mr N. W. Rowell and the Liberal party in Ontario are giving more and more attention to the agricultural situation in the province and it is evident that they consider it one of the most pressing problems of the day.

At Woodstock on Feb. 6th, Mr Rowell laid special emphasis on the question of rural life. He pointed out the serious situation arising from the decline in rural population in Old Ontario and showed that it affected all branches of life including the school and the church. He referred to the agricultural commission appointed in 1881 by the government of Sir Oliver Mowat to investigate rural conditions in Ontario. "That investigation," declared Mr Rowell, "started a new era in the agricultural development of Ontario. More than thirty years have passed since then and the time has now come when we should have another stock-taking and a thorough agricultural survey. Let us get at the facts."

Mr Rowell referred to the Opposition's proposal at the last Session of the Legislature that the government should appoint a thorough, independent and non-partisan commission, and pointed out that the Government had refused. The Leader of the Opposition promised that the resolution would be re-introduced this year.

Mr Rowell took up a number of questions of interest to the rural communities, including farm labor, good roads, extension of the Hydro Electric to the farmers, radial railways, co-operation and agricultural education.
