Legislature Notes
(Special to the Review.)

With a function marked by the usual brilliancy and formality, the Ontario Legislature opened on Wednesday, Feb. 18th. The comparative uneventfulness of the Prime Minister's opening speech was more than made up for by the fact that it was the first time since the late Sir James had been in the House that he had been in a critical condition.

It is generally agreed however, that Sir James will be unable to return to active political life and the problem of choosing his successor is giving the Conservative party more worry even than the general public would imagine. In fact the Conservative members themselves admit a trace of pessimism.

Hon. J. J. Foy will lead the House this Session, but he does not want the post permanently. Who, then, will be the leader of the Government?

The Conservatives feel so uncertain about it that they are comparing the present situation in Ontario with that which followed the retirement of Sir John A. Macdonald in the Federal Field. The Conservative party after a few years of weak rule and dissension went to pieces and a Liberal Government came into power. Such a breakdown is feared now in Ontario.

Hon. Adam Beck will not serve under Hon. W. J. Hanna, nor will the latter act under the former. In spite of his undoubted elements of strength moreover, there are increasing protests against the selection of Mr Hanna.

Not only is he still under the shadow of the Proudfoot charges which established a serious case against the Minister, backed up by his own admission and which admittedly were not given a full investigation, but he is also Corporation counsel for the Standard Oil interests in Ontario and this important fact alone is militating strongly against the selection of such a man for the position of Prime Minister.

EGREMONT COUNCIL
Council met Feb 14th. Minutes adopted. Mr Cook a representative of School Fairs, waited upon the council soliciting a grant. The matter was discussed in detail.

McRobb—Gordon—That no action be taken.—Carried.

Robb—Gordon That this Council pass a resolution memorializing the Ontario Government to amend the system of appointing the Dep-reeve by population as at present and substitute by Assessment and a copy of this resolution be sent to Dr. Jamieson, M. P. P., to present it to the government and the clerk send a copy to the adjoining municipalities.—Carried.

McRobb That Chas Schriber be appointed fence-viewer and pound-keeper in place of T J Gordon.—Carried.

Robb—McRobb That C A Drumm's tender for cement for tile making be accepted.—Carried.

Gordon—Ferguson That the application of Joseph O'Connell, Jas Quinn and R Sizer be united to be on baseline be granted and clerk prepare a by-law to that effect.—Carried.

Resolved that the following be the Road Divisions for the Comrs for 1914:

Division No 1. T J Gordon, Comr. Cons 4, 6 & 8 to blind line con 8-9 and out Kelley's sideline to O R R and south to Mr. Forest.

No 2, C W Robb, cons 9, 10, 11, 12 to blind line con 12-13 and out Halley's sideline to O R R then south to H-Holiday's sideline.

No 3, Chas McRobb Comr from blind line, cons 13, 14, 16, 18, 20, 22 from Proton T L to 10 sideline inclusive.

No 4, Comr Ferguson cons 14, 16, 18, 20, 22 from 10th sideline W to O R R and from Swanston's sideline north to Glenelg T Line.

A resolution was passed in accordance with Chap 36, 34 George V, an act respecting the public construction and operation of Electric Railways, which this Council desires to be brought into operation and the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to forward copies of this resolution to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council and to the Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro Electric Power Commission of the province of Ontario.—Carried.

The Auditors presented their report which was carefully gone over by the reeve and council.

Gordon—Ferguson That the Auditor's Report for 1913 be adopted and each receive \$10 00 for his services and clerk get 200 copies printed. Car.

By-law No 283 to appoint Collectors passed. F Hopkins for N D and E Robb for S D were appointed, salary \$40.00 each.

By-law No 284 to appoint path-masters passed. List will be published later.

By-law No 285 to authorize the reeve and Treas. to borrow money passed.

The Treasurer's resignation was read, asking it to take effect on March 5th.

Ferguson—Gordon That we accept of the Treasurer's resignation and that the clerk ask for applications for Treasurer, to be read at next meeting of council and that the reeve and clerk are hereby appointed to inventory of all books and documents in his possession, belonging to the township.—Carried.

Resolved that the following accounts be paid:

L B Nich 100, use of hall for Nomination..... \$ 3 00

Peter Match, bonus for wire fence..... 8 00

Wm. Longheed, use of Council room..... 2 00

All applications for building wire fences for which a bonus is to be asked must be sent in to the clerk in writing and will be considered by the council and notice given of approval or rejection.

Robb—McRobb That we now adjourn to meet on Thursday, March 5th, to appoint a Treasurer. Applicants are required to name three sureties with the corporation to the amount of \$12,000.00 freehold; and other business.
