An Appeal to Young Men.

To my old High School friends:
Glad to greet you all in your different labours. Mostly every one of us are out in the world with ideals and purposes. And shining forth from everyone's life, we cannot help but see the ambition of youth. Give me a man that's a man, filled with ambition's fire, who sets his mark in the past and keeps moving it higher and higher. This verse has often appealed to me since my eventful years in H. S. at Durham.
I am in the missionary work here, as you would see by my last letter in the Advance or in personal correspondence. I like it very, very much, but remember it is mingled with some sad touches when Poverty and Death is concerned. I have been having a funeral each week lately and these have a very sad post. Ask me when I was a rollicking, careless youth two years ago. If now I would be placed to minister unto others in the hour of Death. I would have smiled. So the future seems to be veiled mystery to us all. The little children who to-day are playing among the things of Nature, to-morrow are singing praises to Whom all hearts should swell in praise; the heavy head that stoops to-day beneath the burden of old age, to-morrow is rejoicing to say farewell to gain his crown and his reward. And so Life seems more and more to be a struggle of flesh and blood, a rising and falling in individual and collective advancement, that only finds relief in Death, the gateway from the mists of morning into the Perfect Day.
What are you deciding upon for your life work? I feel that the young men of the mission fields are the ones called upon to give the call from this work unto the young blood of this dearly purchased Canada. The world ever loves the man who will stand up and say to God and the ages—"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course."
To me the real struggle and conflict that men must engage in is (with an intense yearning through the love of God and Christ) the fight with Sin—the Sin which is within our hearts and without in our fellow man's heart. The struggle is a patient one, a slow onward progress in conflict, a steady augmentation of Right over Wrong. Our ideal is the triumph, ringing out like the bugle call, to weary Christian soldiers from Christ upon the cross "It is finished."
And more than that—dear young friend, consider Life in its destiny! When you come to the end of the Street of Time and Christ stands over the side; Will you then look to His kindly eye and the blush on your sin-face hide? When we consider that the occupation of the angels in heaven is to re-echo praises around God's throne, if we commence not this Life in praising Him, who showed such faith in us on the cross, how can we, in all earnestness, expect His glad "well done."
Lastly, consider this—God needs you, Christ needs you, Broken hearts cry out to you! The great Physician has still the magic touch that can heal the lowest. Let us give our heart now to One who has knoeked so out and enter his blessed work.
